Production Problem

In recent weeks there has been considerable discussion in The Guardian regarding the reasons why there is a teacher shortage in Prince Edward Island. Some take the view that the training hurdle is too high, that if one year only was required to turn out qualified teachers instead of two, many more "qualified" teachers would be available. It's a bit difficult to refute an argument like that. It seems almost axiomatic as far as it goes. It is also true that if automobile manufacturers didn't take so long making sure that the brakes are efficient, that the engine is smooth-running, that the springs are able to absorb shocks, and that the body is beautiful, a lot more cars could be turned out for the general public too. This wonderful discovery to improve mass production should be passed on to the outer world!

Grade A-1 and Culls

There is a strange anomaly in our system of training teachers for the public schools. No doubt the two-year course did cause a shrinkage in the number deciding to train for teachers. We get around this problem, mark you, by issuing permits to young men and women having little or no training. Thus, we take more pains to produce better, more efficient teachers, and if, because of this, our teacher supply does not meet the demand, then we throw down the training hurdle which we had made higher, and let others come in as teachers virtually without training at all. It's like insisting that all eggs on the market be Grade A-1, and then throwing in to the market the cracked, those with blood spots, and all other culls because of the resulting egg shortage.

Chez La Femme!

One suggestion was to the effect that girls didn't want to marry teachers so that the male potential pedagogues would naturally shy away from the profession. It seems difficult to do into any kind of problem without finding a woman somewhere at the bottom of it.

Supply And Demand

There must be a way to keep up the high training standards established some years ago and yet of turning out enough teachers to meet the demand. Now when eggs are scarce, what happens? When the supply of butter falls below the demand, what happens? Why, the price goes up, of course. Teachers on Prince Edward Island must be a strange commodity. When the supply gets below the demand, does the price go up? No, the quality goes down! Making the work attractive by paying a living wage might help.

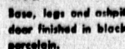
