Sudden Death Yesterday At Summerside

The death occurred suddenly yesterday afternoon of David A. Cameron, who passed away while shopping in R. C. Holman's store about 3:30 p. m.

Mr. Cameron had driven down by car to Summerside with some neighbors from his home in Sunnyside, near Wellington and was transacting business in the office when he took a weak turn and passed away almost immediately. Dr. W. B. Lowitt was called and after examination death was due to sudden heart attack.

Mr. Cameron was 68 years of age and was a native of Sunnyside and lived on the farmstead. He was a man of exemplary character and a devoted member of the Immaculate Conception Church at Wellington. He had an exceptionally fine voice and choir master for many years in the parish church he dedicated his gift to the service of the church. Until failing health caused him to retire he had guided the choir without many young men in the music of the Mass. His death although a great shock to his family was not wholly unexpected as he had been in failing health for some years.

Mr. Cameron was an excellent farmer carrying on his work in a quiet way and was most highly esteemed in the community where he lived.

He leaves to mourn his widow, two daughters Mrs. Archie Campbell, Summerside and Miss Mamie Cameron, housekeeper for Rev. J. B. Croker, St. Theresa's, and six sons, Felix, Benjamin, Roland and Clifford at home and William and George in New Brunswick, also one sister, Miss Mary Cameron of Richmond. His funeral was held at the bereaved family funeral arrangements are not yet completed and the remains are resting at Compton's Funeral Home until this morning.

The pioneer days of the west, filled with adventure, evil and romance form the background of Warner Bros. Technicolor production "Dodge City" which opened last night at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside. The art of technicolor has glorified this western city and surrounding country, and the west is seen in all its beauty. It is full of action and romance play a part as well.

Errol Flynn with his virile, adventurous personality, makes an ideal figure for the story of a venturesome young Irish soldier of fortune, who has become a cowboy in Texas after fighting in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. The picture portrays colorful scenes of a frontier town in an expanding United States during a period which has been aptly described as "wild and woolly".

It is a production of a scope and authenticity that may well make it remembered as a milestone in modern picture history.

Flynn, of course, dominates the action of the piece throughout, but he is given valiant assistance by a very expert ensemble of supporting players. Lester Willis Gill Dies In Toronto

Lester Willis Gill, 68, principal of the Hamilton Technical Institute, died in hospital here today following an operation performed last Friday.

Both his Princes Edward Island, he left home when 18 years old and went to Boston. He worked successively as a livery stable helper, street car conductor, a carpenter, a painter and a handyman.
