Contract Expected Soon For S'ide Wharf Project

By FARMER TISSINGTON, Capital Bureau, The Guardian (OTTAWA)—It is expected that a contract will be awarded soon for a \$130,000 extension to a warehouse shed and wharf improvements at Summerside, J. Watson MacNaught's office revealed Thursday. Earlier this week, in answer to a question from Health Macquarrie, MP for Queens, the government said

that the department of public works does not intend to extend the wharf at Summerside. Mr. MacNaught's office explained that there was a misunderstanding as some \$4,000 had been earmarked for wharf improvements and that the project had been completed or is in the process. In addition, a grant of \$88,000 will be set aside for a 200 foot extension to the east

side. This is the second half of a 400 foot extension requested by Mr. MacNaught when he was a member of parliament in 1959. The solicitor general said he hoped the work could be started and completed this year before the winter. It is possible, he said, that the work will be undertaken first thing in the spring.

Root Worms Hit Turnip, Cabbage And Cauliflower

Many fields of cabbage, cauliflower and turnips are being ruined by what one man has suggested must be the worst infestation of root worms in history, certainly in many years.

Entomologist Dean Read at the Experimental Farm said the infestation has spread across the province. Many fields of early turnips and cabbage have already been completely destroyed because of conditions in 1962, the severity of in-

festations will continue throughout the season. Broad treatments of aldrin-fertilizer mixtures have in many cases been completely ineffective in controlling the pests. In fact, because of the destruction of beneficial parasites and predators, maggot infestations are much more or severe than would normally occur, he said. The only salvation for crops already planted is to apply drench treatments of newer insecticides around the plants.
