

# Ti-Cats Upset Alouettes; Ottawa Blasts Argonauts

 Revenge-minded Hamilton Tiger-Cats turned on Montreal Alouettes for a 50-14 triumph Saturday which made up for their 22-14 shellacking in Montreal last week and virtually assured them of a second-place finish in the Big Four Football Union.

Tiger-Cats wind up the Big Four schedule in Ottawa next Saturday and the Rough Riders, who clinched a play-off spot by defeating Toronto Argonauts 30-19, need a 30-point victory to nail down second place.

In the Western Interprovincial Football Union, top-dog Edmonton Eskimos bowed 33-0 to Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the final game of the season Saturday night. The result had no bearing on final league standings since Saskatchewan Roughriders had already wrapped up second place with an identical 33-0 win over tail-end Calgary Stampeders in the afternoon.

**FIERCE COMEBACK**  
 The Tiger-Cats with quarter Tony Curcio directing a fierce aerial and ground attack, rocked the Alouettes with heavy tackles and forced the usually reliable Sam Etcheverry to fumble at critical times. Curcio, playing with a cast protecting his broken left wrist, tossed four touchdown passes, and twice plunged over the Montreal line.

Hal Patterson scored both Montreal touchdowns on passes from Etcheverry who also kicked a single.

Ottawa, coached by Frank Clair, the man Toronto Argonauts had all hope for the Toronto club. It was Argonauts' most disastrous campaign in its long history.

The Riders beat Argos in all

four games they played and it was sweet revenge for Clair, dropped by the Toronto club as coach after the 1954 season after leading them for five years and to two Grey Cup titles.

A crowd of 15,534 saw the Argos suffer their seventh straight defeat Saturday in an aerial duel between quarterbacks Arnie Baliffa of Argos and Hal Ledyard. Baliffa tossed a record 52 passes, completing 26 for 430 yards and with three of them going for the Argo touchdowns. Ledyard threw two TD passes in connecting on 19 tosses in 34 attempts.

Bob Simpson, veteran Ottawa end, scored two touchdowns on passes of 20 and 24 yards to finish off drives of 78 and 85 yards. End Bucky Curtis scored two touchdowns for Toronto.

**RECORDS SHATTERED**  
 Saskatchewan, led by quarterback Frank Trijucka's devastating aerial attack, shattered individual and team passing records for passes completed and yards gained in passing.

Ken Carpenter scored two touchdowns and Pete Thodos and Rod Pantano one each as the Roughriders piled up a 25-0 halftime lead over the Stamps with 17 points coming in the second quarter.

Trijucka completed 14 passes for an unofficial total of 216 completions, beat the old record of 204, set by Indian Jack Jacobs for Winnipeg in 1951.

Edmonton coach Pop Ivy went all the way against Winnipeg with a second-string backfield. Star quarterback Jackie Parker was dressed but did not see action while halfbacks Rolfe Miles, Normie Kwong, Earl Lindley and Johnny Bright stayed at home.

Buddy Leake and Bob McNa-

mara carried most of the mail for the Bombers. Leake scoring two touchdowns and three converts to take the league scoring title with 103 points.

In the Senior Intercollegiate League, Saturday University of Toronto Blues downed University of Western Ontario 41-7 while Queen's defeated McGill 20-15.

# Rangers, Leafs Play 1-1 Draw

NEW YORK (CP)—With both teams playing superb defensive hockey, Toronto Maple Leafs and New York Rangers played to a 1-1 tie in a National Hockey League game at Madison Square Garden Sunday night.

Dean Prentice scored the first goal at 8:27 of the second period, when he fired the puck past goalie Gump Worsley. That ended the scoring until 14:24 of the third period when Cary Aldcorn, on assists by Tim Horton and George Armstrong, scored the tie-maker.

Except for the two shots, both goalies—Worsley and Ed Chadwick of the Leafs—played faultless games behind the sound work of their defences. Worsley had 32 saves and Chadwick had 30.

From the start of the game, both teams played hard-hitting hockey that landed seven men in the penalty box during the first period.

In the other NHL game, Boston Bruins shut out Montreal Canadiens 1-0 on Cal Gardner's second-period goal.

Duff, with two goals, led Leafs into second place temporarily, at least. The loss was Hawks' third straight and sixth in seven starts. They are last with one point, a tie against Montreal Canadiens.

Rookie Garry Aldcorn and Barry Cullen and defencemen Jimmy Morrison scored the winners' other goals. Nick Mickoski and Eddie Litzenberger were the Hawks marksmen.

The first period was scoreless and Leafs took a 2-1 lead in the

second. They scored three more in the final frame before Mickoski got Hawks' second goal in the final minute of play.

Leafs had previously lost to Detroit Red Wings and battled Boston Bruins to a tie in their other home games. In both contests, they fired in the last period. But they finished strongly Saturday and, but for the fine work of Chicago goaltender Al Rollins, might have scored a few more goals.

# Barbizon Captures Honors In World's Richest Race

 CAMDEN, N. J. (AP)—Barbizon, from Kentucky's Calumet Farm, rushed down the stretch Saturday and snatched victory from Federal Hill and Amarullah in a thrilling photo finish of the world's richest horse race—the \$319,210 Garden State Stakes.

The three horses passed under the wire almost together, after the favored Bold Ruler tripped and all but went down on the final turn, finishing 17th in the field of 19 two-year-olds.

Suddenly Bold Ruler seemed to stumble and almost went down. The colt quickly dropped back to about eighth place.

Barbizon, a dark bay son of Polynesian-Gold blood, by Bull Lea, was coupled with another colt as an entry, and paid a lusty \$15.20, \$7 and \$5.20.

At Laurel, Traffic Judge gained his first victory of the 1956 season in the \$20,000-added Turi Cup, a mile and one-eighth feature race. Jack Westrope brought home the Clifford Mooers' horse in 1:54 1-5.
