BRITISH LEADERS' OPINIONS OF THE WAR

The Leaders of Parliament, as the people of Great Britain at large, are practically unanimous as to the necessity and justice of war with the Boers. In the House of Lords the Earl of Kimberley is alone with the Marquis of Salisbury. The case for Great Britain was plainly stated by the latter when he said:

"The Boer Government were pleased to dispense with any explanation on our part respecting the causes or justification of the war. They have done what no provocation on our part could have justified. They have done what the strongest nation has never in its strength done to any opponent it had challenged. They issued a defiance so audacious that I could scarcely depict it without using words unbecoming to this assembly, and by so doing they liberated this country from the necessity of explaining to the people of England why we are at war. But for this no one could have predicted that we would ever be at war. There have been very grave questions between us; but up to the time of the ultimatum the modes we had suggested of settling them were successful, and the spirit in which we were met was encouraging. We lately had hoped that the future had in reserve for us a better fate."

"But now all questions of possible peace, all question of justifying the attitude we had assumed and all question of pointing out the errors and the grave opposition of which the Transvaal has been guilty—all these questions have been wiped away in this one great insult which leaves no other course than the one which has received the assent of the whole nation and which it is our desire to carry out."

In the House of Commons, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, Liberal leader of the House of Commons, said that the demands made by the Government of the South African Republic were such as to make it impossible for the Government of any self-respecting country even to take them into consideration. "Actual hostilities have commenced," said Sir Henry, "and an active aggression has been committed, which it is the plain duty of our Ministers of Parliament, and of the people to resist."

The Leader of the Opposition went on to congratulate the Government on the choice made of officers to whom the main charge of the "expedition" had been given. Never, he believed, had so capable and experienced a staff been despatched from the shores of England. Our natural position in South Africa," he declared, "has placed upon us the duty of seeing any impediment to our own supremacy removed. On that we are all agreed. The Liberal leader criticised in a general way the diplomacy of the government and Mr. Balfour replied in respect to the points noted, concluded with the declaration that "if war must come it has seldom been entered into by Great Britain upon an issue which was more clearly an issue of righteousness and liberty, and we have undoubted proof that our self-governing colonies beyond the seas are with us heart and soul."

—It has been proved, again, that though Prince Edward Island is a small place, she is the mother of able men. We heartily congratulate the Abegweit-Crescent Football Club of this city upon their notable success in Halifax.

AN EXAMPLE NOT TO BE FOLLOWED.

Mr. HARDY has retired from the Leadership of the Government of Ontario and Mr. Ross has taken his place. Mr. Hardy will, it is said, accept a Judgeship. Unfortunately there are neither Judgeships nor Governorships for our Mr. Farquharson, even though he is, according to Mr. Arthur Peters, Q. C., one of the most unpopular men in the province. If this be true—and we are not disposed to doubt its truth—Mr. Farquharson cannot have the confidence of the country,—but he will, nevertheless, not follow Mr. Hardy's example until forced to do so. He cannot fall back upon a judgeship.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Government is making considerable repairs to the North Cape Lighthouse says L'Impartial. Is it another job? Some kicker must get quieted. But Mr. Tarte thinks it a great sin to buy votes—when they're not wanted.

—The manager of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Dawson, says that the gold output of the Yukon last year was about \$18,000,000. He says that Alexander McDonald, the Bonanza King, paid \$100,000 this season as royalty to the Government, and that he has never been hard up as reported.

—The Daily Telegraph, of Kingston Jamaica, remarks: "Some institutions in Jamaica may be falling in decay; but the bank of Nova Scotia is not one of them. It is only a few days ago since the branch office of the Bank was opened in Kingston; but, thanks to the energy, tact and business aptitude of the gentlemen who have had charge of the office—notably the present manager, Mr. W. P. Hunt—the Bank has made gigantic strides both in business transactions and in public favour." This is the more interesting as Mr. W. P. Hunt is a son of Richard Hunt, Esq., of Summerside and well known to many of our readers. It appears that the Bank of Nova Scotia in Jamaica, is about to issue a small paper currency under the authority of a special Act of the Canadian Parliament.

FOOTBALL.—The Dalhousies' defeated the Abegweits at Halifax on Wednesday afternoon, the score at the finish being 11 to 0. But the Abegweits returned the compliment yesterday by defeating the Wanderers, the score in this game being 6 to 5.

At Victoria Park yesterday afternoon the Anchors defeated a picked team from Charlottetown, by a score of 14 to 0. The game was interesting and at times some good football was put up.
