

International Trade Fair Shaping Up Well For B.C.

By STEPHEN SCOTT VANCOUVER (CP) — Almost exactly a year before it is scheduled to open, the British Columbia International Trade Fair has the "X" sign painted on its largest fair ever despite the world's fair in Montreal, are wondering how long the sign will remain under the blotter.

Almost all of the 85,000 square feet of covered exhibition space at the Pacific National Exhibition is committed or asked for and the fair is considering acquiring more covered space at the 40-acre site.

No prospective exhibitor in the B.C. government-sponsored fair May 17 to 27 is being turned away, officials said. Hut countries and industries who have made inquiries now are being asked to make up their minds.

Dominion Stores Earnings Higher

TORONTO (CP) — Dominion Stores Ltd. had record net earnings of \$10,655,576 or \$1.22 a share in the year ended March 31 compared with \$10,077,827 or \$1.25 a share last year. Thomas G. McCormack says in the annual report released here.

Sales jumped 5.3 per cent to \$513,656,740 from \$487,735,081. Mr. McCormack said the ratio of net earnings to sales remained at 2.07 per cent. This means that before Dominion Stores makes \$2.07, a shopper has to spend \$100 in one of its stores.

Total expenses were up \$7,500,000 of which \$3,800,000 is in increased employees' salaries and benefits. Another major factor was the "spiralling level" of municipal taxes in the 197 communities in which Dominion does business.

At year-end, the company has 64 new stores in various stages of development or negotiation. About 31 are scheduled to open this year. The company now operates 377 stores across Canada.

Working capital at March 19 was \$26,748,595, up \$2,057,324.

Man Is Fined In Lottery Case

SUDBURY (CP) — Harold Heale, president of the Royal Canadian Legion at Copper Cliff, Ont., was fined \$1,000 after pleading guilty here to a charge of conducting a lottery between October, 1965 and March, 1966.

The fine came on the urging of Crown Attorney E. A. Burbridge. The Legion had been notified earlier, and the lottery was stopped for a time but on some orders was resumed.

Mr. Burbridge said even churches are receiving heavy fines on similar charges and "in this case we should not be thinking of a fine in terms of hundreds of dollars but rather in terms of thousands of dollars."

Magistrate Anthony Falzetta, in sentencing Heale said: "The Legion, not the accused, will be required to satisfy any monetary penalty I impose, but the conviction is registered against Heale, not the Legion branch, and he will carry the stigma of the Legion."

Heale, whose offices of the Legion branches in the district had acted as agents for the Copper Cliff branch also pleaded guilty Wednesday.

Canadian Tire Buys Interest In Finance Firm

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian Tire Corp. has bought a 90-per cent interest in Midland Acceptance, president, says in the annual report.

Midland, based in Niagara Falls, is a private company which provides customer credit in Canadian Tire stores.

Mr. Billes said Canadian Tire intends to expand its store credit system as a method of increasing sales.

Grimsby managing director K.C. Rowe said the purchase was made to "expand and diversify our operations."

Grimsby manufactures equipment for trawlers.

Mr. Rowe said there also would be a "substantial expansion" in the number of employees now at Acadia. It employs 39 persons.
