

ST. PETER'S BOYS AND GIRLS SCHOOLS

The Closing Exercises Last Evening.

LIST OF THE WINNERS OF PRIZES AND HONORABLE MENTION.

The large schoolroom at St. Peter's Cathedral was crowded last night on the occasion of the public distribution of prizes to the scholars in the Day Schools. The chair was taken promptly at 8 o'clock by His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor. On the platform were the Master of the Rolls and His Honor Judge Fitzgerald. The Rev. James Simpson reported in his opening address that there had been forty-eight scholars attending the schools during the past year, of whom fifteen were girls and thirty-three boys. Their ages were from four years to twenty, and the range of studies had included the teaching of the alphabet to four children and the preparing of two for matriculation at King's College, Windsor.

The results of the examinations were very satisfactory, and a high average had been attained by nearly all the pupils. The reading staff had consisted of Rev. James Simpson, M. A., Rev. T. H. Hunt, M. A., Mr. Justice Hodgson, L. L. D., and Mr. DeBrisey, B. A., in the boys' school; and Miss DeBrisey and Mr. Scoville in the girls' school. After the singing of a song by the scholars the distribution of prizes in the girls' school took place as given below. The children then presented Miss DeBrisey with a set of silver studs and a scarf pin. Mr. Justice Hodgson next examined his class on the Constitutional History of Canada, and the ready answers of the boys on numerous intricate questions met with great applause.

CHARLOTTETOWN SCHOOLS, The Midsummer Examinations.

The first in the trio of City Schools this year is Queen Square School. The closing exercises were held there to-day. The attendance of visitors was small, but included His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Howland, Hon. David Laird, Dr. Anderson and Dr. Morrison, Rev. Father Reid, Rev. Father Hogan, Dr. Johnson, Thomas Handbrach, John Ings, N. Stainlaus Blanchard, and Archibald Kennedy, Esq., of the City School Board, Dr. Conroy and Mrs. Conroy, Mrs. A. D. McLeod, and others. After a satisfactory oral examination of the classes, the scholars were massed in the upper hall, where songs were sung and the certificates of the Board and the Lieutenant-Governor's medals and other prizes presented, and where short addresses were delivered by the chairman (Dr. Johnson), the Lieutenant-Governor, Dr. Anderson, Dr. Morrison and Hon. David Laird. These gentlemen all expressed the pleasure and gratification of the visitors in respect to the continued improvement of the School and the progress of the scholars. Dr. Johnson said that the pupils of the city schools, as a whole, had behaved well in the past year, and had given the Board very little trouble. He thanked the teachers of Queen Square School for their assiduity and zeal in the important work assigned to them, and expressed his acknowledgment of the good service rendered by the grading officer and Secretary of the School Board, Mr. Ewen Stewart. Lieutenant-Governor Howland presented his medal for best essay on Canada and its Resources to the winner, Master C. J. Moren. He commended the boys for their singing of "There's room at the top," and exhorted them to strive to get there, and to a credit to their country wherever they may rove. Dr. Anderson, after complimenting the teachers upon the efficiency evidenced in the examination, spoke particularly of the importance of acquiring a proper attitude and style of reading. The remarks of Dr. Morrison and Hon. David Laird, were complimentary and encouraging to teachers and pupils. We regret that a further report is to-day impossible. The following is the PRIZE LIST:

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

Proposed Reduction of the Governor-General's Salary.

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The British Political Situation.

LONDON, June 25. The United Press learns that Lord Salisbury will accept the Premiership on condition that the Liberal leaders will agree not to oppose his Government getting the necessary estimates before the dissolution of Parliament, and that no member of the cabinet which he forms shall be opposed for re-election upon taking office. The Central News issues bulletins stating that it is difficult to obtain official information as to what took place between the Queen and Lord Salisbury. There is reason to believe that Salisbury declined to form a ministry, and recommended an immediate dissolution of Parliament.

THE NEWFOUNDLAND LOAN.

LONDON, June 25. The Newfoundland loan is a success. The tenders were opened yesterday, and £5,610,975 was applied for, being \$311,995 in excess of the loan minimum. The price was 95 (not 93), as before stated. All above this were received in full. The tenders at the minimum amounted to £487,760, and these got 36 per cent. of the loan.
