Mr. Menzies suggests. For the commercial fishery, Mr. Menzies proposed a reduction in the number of drift nets operating off New Brunswick's Miramichi, one of the world's greatest salmon streams and a reduction in their size. Drift nets are towed behind boats outside the mouths of salmon rivers.

Mr. Menzies recommends, too, that all shore and drift nets in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick be taken up for a fortnight at the end of June. New Brunswick now has a fortnight's holiday about that time for drift nets only to allow spawning fish to get upriver.

tory. Lord Balfour of Bureigh talks of the "brink" of disaster. Churchill may give the House an outline tomorrow or Wednesday of the outcome of his talks in Washington with President Truman.
