HAUNTED BY A TELEGRAPH INSTRUMENT.

A Murderer's Touch on
the Instrument Betrayed
him.

Dick Ramsey and I had gone west to

took myself.

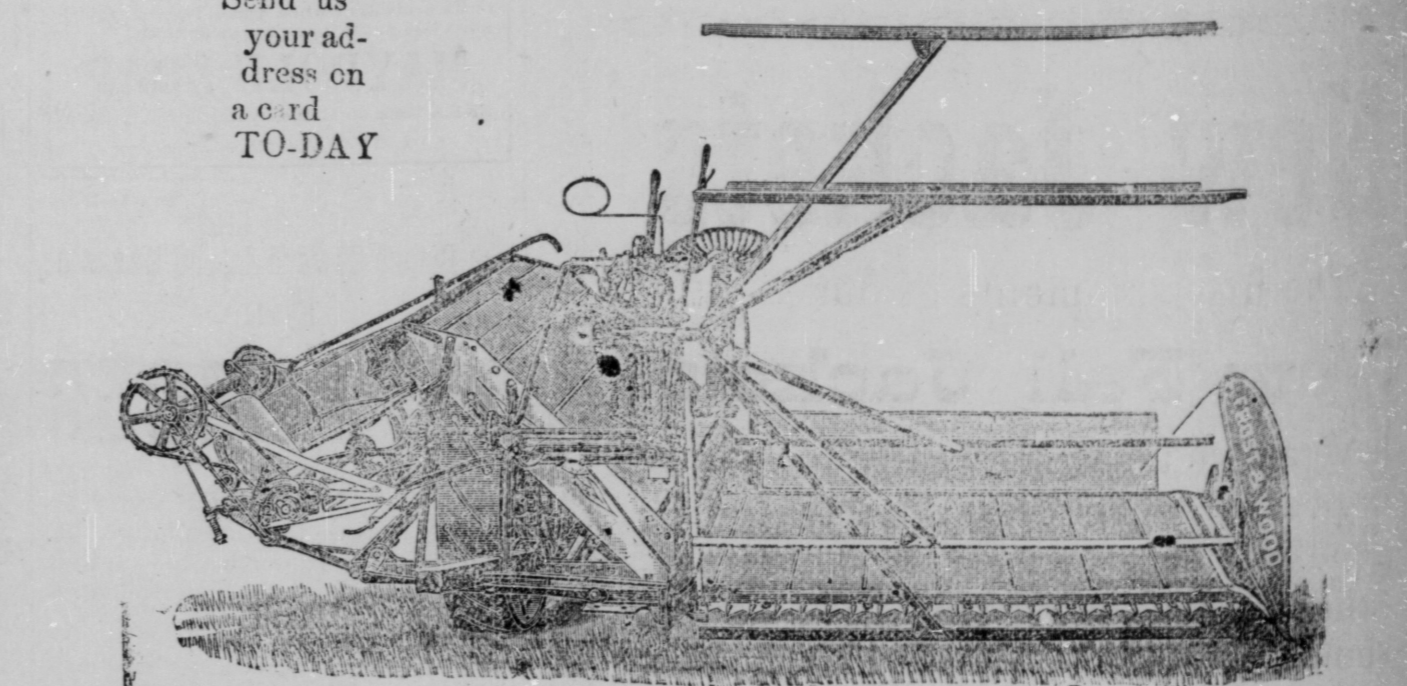
Scarcely realizing what I was doing,
