THE SOCIETY TEA.—The tea party at Souris today, in aid of St. Mary's Church at that place, is largely attended. Numbers of people went by train, and as the day is so fine the event is bound to be most enjoyable.

APPOINTMENT.—The Canada Gazette of the 21st July, inst., announces that His Excellency the Governor-General has been pleased to appoint Walter Augustus Ormsby, Esquire, Barrister-at-Law, to be one of Her Majesty's Counsel learned in the Law.

ANOTHER RECORD BROKEN. F. Davies and B. C. Prowse left the city last evening at 11 o'clock, arriving at Hamilton's hotel at 23 minutes, making the distance in 54 minutes. Davies led Prowse by about two minutes. The last four or five miles were done in the dark.

SUPREME COURT.

Valentine Cameron vs. Ferman Jodienx. An action for damages for malpractice, tried at the present Trinity term, when a verdict was found for the plaintiff for \$200 damages. A rule nisi was afterwards obtained to set aside the verdict and for a new trial. This rule was argued yesterday afternoon by Stewart, Q. C., who opposed the new trial on behalf of the plaintiff, and by Mr. Bell, who argued in support of a new trial. The Court, at the conclusion of the argument, discharged the rule nisi and ordered the verdict to stand.

Thompson vs. Thompson.—Tried at Summerside. Mr. McQuarrie, on behalf of the plaintiff, obtained a rule nisi for a new trial, returnable Michaelmas term. In re application of John F. Powers, a prisoner in jail for debt, at the suits of Neil McQuarrie, Arthur C. Rogers and James A. McNeill, all of Summerside. The prisoner has been in jail over three months, and now made application for his discharge or for a weekly allowance, on the ground that he had no property under his control, and could not maintain himself in jail. He had personally applied for relief before the Chief Justice and Judge Holton, but failed on the ground that he had not satisfactorily accounted for his property. Mr. Davies, Q. C., now renewed the application contending that after the expiry of three months Powers was entitled to be discharged, irrespective of the former decision. A long argument ensued, at the end of which Powers was brought up before the Court and submitted to a further examination and severe cross-examination. Mr. Davies again renewed his argument for Powers' release. Mr. Stewart, Q. C., on behalf of the detaining creditors, opposed the discharge, alleging that Powers had been guilty of fraud and had not satisfactorily accounted for his property, which the counsel contended was in Boston under the charge of prisoners' wife. The court reserved its decision until this morning, when the Chief Justice refused the application for discharge, but gave leave to renew it again with liberty to produce evidence regarding the Boston property in possession of Powers' wife. The Court then adjourned until the 9th August to enable Powers to produce further evidence.

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, July 22.—A Rome despatch says: In consequence of the continued arrests of anarchists, the governors of prisons in Milan, Turin, Bologna, and elsewhere, have telegraphed the government that they are unable to receive more prisoners. The police claim that all dangerous anarchists who have not fled have been arrested.

PRETORIA, Transvaal, July 22.—Chief Makochi and his followers have been driven from the caves in which they took refuge from Transvaal troops. The work was accomplished by native allies of the Boers who surprised the rebels and forced them to come out of their hiding place. Ten rebels were killed.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 22.—It is conclusively established that more than a thousand persons were killed by the recent earthquakes.

RAVENSBRICK, N. Y., July 22.—A cyclone half a mile wide near this place on Saturday did \$100,000 damage.

St. Petersburg, July 22.—The cholera epidemic is rapidly spreading.

DUBLIN, July 22.—O'Donovan Rossa arrived at Liverpool on Friday evening for the purpose of organizing a monument to the memory of the Manchester martyrs. He was met at the railway station by a crowd of people, who formed in procession and with torches and bands of music paraded the streets. At least 10,000 people were present.

St. Louis, Mo., July 22.—A special to the Republic from Birmingham, Ala., says: On account of the serious state of affairs growing out of the miners' strike, both the police force and fire department have been doubled. There has been rumors to-day that the miners intend to march to Birmingham in a body and attack and set fire to the city and release the 120 strikers now in jail charged with the Pratt miners' riot. Nearly every citizen is armed and the citizens reserve force, recently organized, are ready for action. The Third regiment of state troops arrived here to-day, replacing the First regiment. Gov. Jones says that the law will be upheld at all hazards. Much apprehension is felt.

The Mark Lane Express presents in a striking manner the contrast between Cobden's predictions concerning the effects of free trade and the actual experience of 50 years. Here they are:—

Prophecy—Land would not be driven out of cultivation by the repeal of the corn laws.

Fact—Nearly 2,500,000 acres have been driven out.

Prophecy—Land owners have nothing to fear from trade in corn.

Fact—Rents and agricultural land values have fallen from 30 to 50 per cent.

Prophecy—In a country growing in population and advancing in prosperity, land always increases in value and with out any help from the owners.

Fact—If all the land in cultivation twenty years ago was worth £20 an acre, and has fallen 40 per cent, that is a loss of £20 an acre.

Prophecy—The land of England would produce 25,000,000 quarters of wheat per annum.

Fact—In 1862 we grew 17,000,000 quarters, in 1892 about 7,000,000.

Prophecy—We should always have a natural protection of 10s 6d per quarter on wheat in the shape of carriage from abroad.

Fact—Freights for wheat are now below 2s a quarter, and it has been carried free as ballast.

Prophecy—We might as well doubt that the sun would rise on the morrow as doubt that in ten years every civilized nation on earth would have followed our free trade example.

Fact—Not a single nation on earth has followed our example, and are now taxing our goods in return for a free market here.
