

Dudley Sends Congratulations To Dynamos

MIDLAND, Ont. (CP)—George F. Dudley, secretary-treasurer of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, offered congratulations to Moscow Dynamos Sunday for their 7-2 victory over Toronto East York which gave the Russians the world hockey championship at Stockholm, Sweden.

"We've got to take our hats off to the Russians," he said. "Their showing today certainly surprised me. They deserve our congratulations on their victory."

Mr. Dudley said considerable thought will have to be given to plans for entering future world hockey tournaments. "There's lots of talk about sending a better team," he commented, "but no one tells us how we're going to get a better team over there."

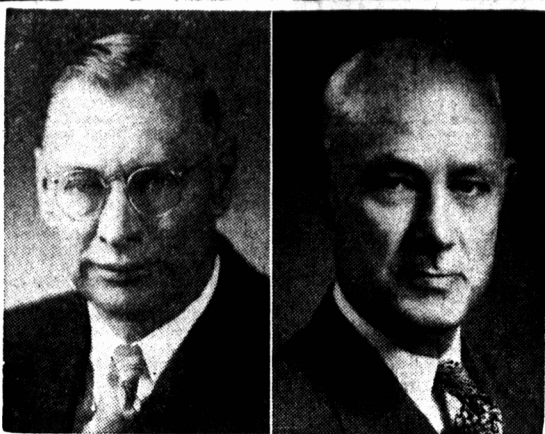
Miss Hyland will play Isabella in "Measure for Measure." She came to London to study at the Royal Academy of Dramatic Art four years ago. This will be her first trip home.

38 Engineers To Study In United Kingdom

OTTAWA, (CP)—Thirty-eight Canadian engineers and engineering students have been chosen to study in the United Kingdom under the 1954 Athlone fellowship awards.

The fellowships, named for the Earl of Athlone, Canadian governor-general from 1940-46, provide two years of study in British universities or industries. Their purpose is to spread knowledge of British engineering among Canadians.

The U. K. government bears the costs of the fellowships, which cover travel, fees and living expenses. Twenty-eight go to final year students and 10 to graduate engineers.

Sask. Budget Brought Down

REGINA, (CP)—A budget calling for revenues of \$78,415,000 and estimated spending of \$78,119,000—largest in Saskatchewan's history—was brought in Wednesday by Provincial Treasurer C. M. Fines for 1954-55.

There were no tax increases or reductions.

Mr. Fines said an increase of about \$8,000,000 over 1953-54 revenue and a corresponding increase over estimated spending will be made possible through continued expansion of the province's economy without borrowing.

The province's surplus for 1952-53 was \$14,890,700 and Mr. Fines said he "confidently" predicts the same trend for the current fiscal year ending March 31.

TORONTO, (CP)—A Toronto bus driver was charged with manslaughter Saturday. After an alleged altercation with a passenger, the passenger died in hospital from a fractured skull, a cerebral hemorrhage and brain injuries.

Lorne F. Perry, 45, the driver, was arrested after the death Friday of Harold L. Sellar, 58, president of a small aerial photo company. Perry was remanded.

Police said they knew nothing of any altercation until they received a phone call from a person who, they said, claimed he had witnessed it.

Vatican Diplomat Greeted At Ottawa

OTTAWA, (CP)—The Pope's new personal representative in Canada Sunday pledged himself to the service of Canadian Roman Catholics and told of this country's growing renown in the world.

Most Rev. Giovanni Panico, veteran Vatican diplomat, was greeted in the capital's Notre Dame Basilica by nine archbishops and bishops from across the country and some 1,200 Ottawa faithful.

Most Rev. Marie Joseph Lemieux, Archbishop of Ottawa, speaking for the Canadian hierarchy, welcomed the 58-year-old prelate in English and French addresses. Msgr. Panico replied in both languages.

Conservatives Plan Annual Convention

OTTAWA, (CP)—The National Progressive Conservative Association will choose a new president at its annual meeting here this month to succeed George Nowlan of Wolfville, N.S.

Mr. Nowlan, member of Parliament for Digby-Annapolis-Kings, has said he will retire after four years in office.

It is understood that two other members of Parliament will be nominated for the presidency: George Hees, member for Toronto Broadview, and Hon. Earl Rowe, from Dufferin-Simcoe constituency. Others may be nominated at the opening day of the two-day annual meeting March 16-17.

Uneasy Over United States Defence Policy

OTTAWA, (CP)—There is uneasiness in Canada's capital concerning United States defence policy.

This uneasiness springs mainly from the recent "retaliate instantly" speech of John Foster Dulles, U.S. secretary of state.

Canadian officials say they are still trying to figure out exactly what Mr. Dulles meant. They added that this should not be surprising because the Americans themselves are apparently still trying to figure it out, too.

The chief questions in Ottawa are: Would the U. S. be prepared to "go it alone" under certain circumstances of aggression? And before the U. S. took any action, would Canada and other U. S. allies be consulted?

Not Consulted On Speech

Canada was not consulted before Mr. Dulles made his New York speech Jan. 12 in which he said: "The way to deter aggression is by the free community to be willing and able to respond vigorously at places and with means of its own choosing...."

The basic decision of President 1942.

Eisenhower and his advisers was to depend primarily upon a great capacity to retaliate, instantly, by means and at places of our choosing.

"The 'free community' presumably would include Canada and other members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization. But, officials here asked, would they be consulted—or how could they—if the U. S. decided to "retaliate instantly?"

Certainly Canada would want to be consulted about any action that would result in a major war. The problem would be less likely to arise, of course, if Russia itself were the aggressor.

Run-Off Condition Of Rivers High

OTTAWA, (CP)—Run-off condition of Canada's rivers was 161 per cent of normal during February compared with 121 per cent in January.

The resources department reported Friday that the run-off of Canada's 22 typical rivers was high for the time of year. Among them were:

- Nova Scotia, the St. Mary, 473; LaHave, 279; New Brunswick, Lepreau, 305; Saint John, 182; Quebec, Outarde, 115; St. Francois, 271; St. Maurice, 99; Harricana, 79.

N. Y. Newspaper Strike Averted

NEW YORK, (AP)—A possible new strike against major New York City newspapers has been averted, with AFL photo-engravers voting to accept a fact-finding board's decision.

The photo-engravers Sunday voted 209 to 75 to accept a weekly package of \$3.75 including wage increases and other benefits. This was the same package that the publishers offered before the engravers went out at six of the city's major newspapers for 11 days during the Christmas shopping season.

The engravers had agreed to let a fact-finding panel decide whether they should get more than the \$3.75 package offered. The board's decision, announced last Tuesday, was not binding on either side, and the engravers could have struck again.

Both Edward J. Volz, president of the International Photo-Engravers Union of North America AFL, and Denis M. Burke, president of Local 1 here, urged the members to accept the recommendations. Burke said: "It's a bitter pill that no one hates to swallow more than I do."

LUXEMBOURG BACKS EDC

LUXEMBOURG, Reuters—The steering committee of Luxembourg's one-house Parliament Monday approved a government bill for ratification of the European defence community treaty. This virtually assured ratification of the treaty in Luxembourg, whose forces would join those of France, West Germany, Belgium, Italy and Holland in the proposed European army.
