**MANITOBA SCHOOL TROUBLE.**  
The order-in-council passed last Thursday dealing with the memorial of Cardinal Taschereau and other Catholic Bishops on the subject of laws relating to education in Manitoba and the Territories, has been signed by His Excellency, says a late Ottawa despatch. The order recites the prayer of the memorialists and recommends that a committee be appointed to order be sent to the Governors of Manitoba and the Territories with a request that the same be laid before their advisers. The order continues: "The committee be appointed to serve to the order-in-council that the same be laid before their advisers. The order is a matter of deep concern and solicitude in the interests of the Dominion at large, and it is a matter of the utmost importance to the people of Canada that laws which prevail in any portion of the Dominion should not be such as to occasion complaint of oppression or injustice to any class or portion of the people, but should be recognized as establishing perfect freedom and equality, especially in all matters relating to religion and religious belief and practice, and the committee would therefore advise that Your Excellency may join with them in expressing the most earnest hope that the legislatures of Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, respectively, may take into consideration at the earliest possible moment the complaints which are set forth in this petition, and which are said to create dissatisfaction among Roman Catholics, not only in Manitoba and the Northwest Territories, but likewise throughout Canada, and may take speedy measures to give redress in all matters in relation to which they may well founded complaint or grievance be ascertained."

**ALL QUIET AT TULLMAN.**  
A late Quebec despatch states that Mayor Hopkins has wired Governor Allgeier asking him to recall eight companies of the First Regiment, I. N. G. This order removes three of the six companies now at Tullman, and leaves but one company on the Illinois Central tracks, that of the Hammond. The mayor said that he felt satisfied that the three companies left at Tullman could maintain order. The second regiment, stationed at the stock yards, will be left there for the present, and the mayor refused to say when the remaining companies of the First Regiment will be withdrawn. This action on the part of the mayor was the result of a conference held between Vice-president Wickes of the Pullman Co. and Adjutant-General Orendorff of the I. N. G. Vice-president Wickes did not anticipate trouble, stating that the company was making no effort to secure new men, and that he expected the employees to eventually go back to work.

The Boston Post, in a recent editorial, remarks: "The situation at present, indeed, is without precedent of recent years. Immigration has fallen off 20 per cent in the past year and is now at a very low ebb, while emigration has increased at a pace heretofore unknown, and now amounts almost to an exodus. The California will probably take out 2,000 from Boston on her next trip; while as for New York, where the greater number arrive and leave, the last month for which statistics are obtainable shows that 20,000 leaving that port to about 15,000 arrivals."

**WOLSELEY'S TRAITS.**  
Some of Them That Drought Success to the English General.  
General Lord Wolseley being promoted in his rank, his becoming Commander-in-Chief of the British Army, the Queen, who loves him, was resolved at least to make him Field Marshal by way of a birthday gift. I have always fancied that having had so much trouble with most of her Irish subjects, the Queen had a specially weak spot in her heart for Wolseley because he was an Irishman and so valiant a Royalist. His Irish nature sticks out in his love of adventure and in his wonderful luck of getting out of perilous scrapes. He entered his profession 42 years ago as a lad of 18, with the rank of ensign. He was rapidly promoted in the field. During his first campaign in Burma he and a brother officer were shot down at the head of a storming party. His companion fell to death in a few minutes, and Wolseley's life was saved almost miraculously after months of extreme suffering. In the Crimea, when he was but 21, he was severely wounded in the trenches before Sebastopol when he was knocked down by a solid shot striking near him, and rendered senseless, while those above him were being killed. He was only once picked up for dead with holes in all parts of his body. The surgeons abandoned hope, but he did not give up. He was determined and fortunate he owed his final recovery only to the loss of an eye.  
This lost eye made him a Captain. He was in the Crimea in the army to receive such a commission, and the military War Office, after a feeble effort to cancel the promotion, felt sure something very dreadful would be done of it. Nor was the War Office mistaken. In the first few months of his new authority Captain Wolseley abolished the leather stock which encumbered the necks of his company, which had been retained as a part of the uniform merely because of a venerable tradition. He also allowed his men, when on active service, to go without hats, who live in times when the English Army has been turned upside down cannot fully appreciate the dignity which came of it. Nor was the War Office mistaken. In the first few months of his new authority Captain Wolseley abolished the leather stock which encumbered the necks of his company, which had been retained as a part of the uniform merely because of a venerable tradition.
