

Sea Cow Head Lighthouse Damaged By Lightning

The Sea Cow Head lighthouse at Fernwood was damaged by lightning on Tuesday afternoon around 4.30 o'clock when an electric storm passed over the area. The bolt struck midway between top and bottom of the lighthouse and smashed a hole 2 to 3 feet in diameter in one side of the wall where the lighthouse is secured by one of four steel cables. The three other walls were damaged also and a closet door within the structure was smashed. A heavy pall of smoke drifted through the interior when the lightning struck. Walter Richards entered the building to inspect the damage. Mr. Richards, together with his family, were inside their nearby home when the crash occurred and witnessed the gaping hole which appeared in the lighthouse. Shingles from the building fell in the yard between the dwelling and the lighthouse.—S

Two N.S. Residents Meet At Famous Heart Clinic

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—An attractive 23-year-old mother and a red-haired, sports-loving boy of 15—both suffering from an unusual heart ailment—met for the first time Wednesday in a surgeon's office here after separate journeys from their respective neighboring towns in Nova Scotia. Both Mrs. Bessie Legge of Sydney and Michael Chiasson of New Waterford made the long trip in the hope that a world-famous Philadelphia surgeon could repair their hearts and thus enable them to resume normal lives. Residents of the Canadian communities raised funds to finance their trips and care. Their meeting was a casual, friendly one at the Bailey Clinic, where they also met for the first time Dr. Charles P. Bailey, professor of thoracic surgery at Hanemann Medical College and Hospital. Their physician, Dr. Samuel Shane of Westmount, N.S., had arranged for treatment in the clinic, established after Dr. Bailey some years ago developing an unusual technique of performing direct surgery on the hearts of patients suffering from valvular conditions that restrict the normal flow of blood.

UNUSUAL OPERATION A part of the operation is a tiny scalpel which is fitted onto the end of the surgeon's index finger. After the patient's chest has been opened to expose the heart, the knife-tipped finger is poked directly into the heart to cut away the blocking tissues. The operation, which attracted worldwide medical attention when first announced some years ago, has since been performed many times. Whether Michael and Mrs. Legge will undergo this operation remains to be determined. Both were admitted to Hanemann

HAD NOT MET BEFORE Mrs. Legge and the Chiassons had not met before although their small communities are only about seven miles apart and the patients were under the care of the same doctor. Members of the families had talked by telephone about the trip plans, but doctors felt Mrs. Legge should make the trip by plane as quickly as possible because of her condition. She said she first became ill before the birth of her son, but had suffered three attacks of rheumatic fever as a child. Michael said he thought his case was more recent, that he had collapsed last spring while playing basketball and medical checks then led to discovery of the heart ailment. "I still like sports," he said. "All sports."

Lightning Kills Valuable Bull In Searletown Barn

The electric storm which passed over Prince County on Tuesday afternoon was especially severe in the vicinity of Borden. At Searletown the storm reached a high state of intensity about 5.00 p.m. and struck the barn of Mr. Kenneth Muttart of that place. No damage was done to the building but a valuable two-year-old Holstein bull within the barn was instantly killed. The barn was under repair at the time and part of the roof was open. It is presumed that the bolt entered this opening and although no marks could be found either on the interior or exterior, the animal died instantly as a result of the bolt. Several men were standing in the yard at the time but fortunately none were inside.—S
