DAX, France (AP) — France's great painter, Maurice Utrillo, a mad genius whose life was tortured by drink and despair, died Saturday of bronchial pneumonia at 71. He died in a hotel here where he had come about a week ago from his suburban home in Paris. His wife Lucie, whom he married in 1935, was at his bedside. Despite his fading health and the fact that for three decades he has lived in a world of twilight reality, Utrillo painted until the end and only recently played himself in a short motion picture bit. Utrillo's beginning marked him for either a quick end or the acclaim of genius. He discovered alcohol at 10 and was a drunkard when he took up painting at 18.
