St. Peters Bay Church Played Historic Role

St. Peters Bay United Church observes its 153rd anniversary on Sunday. Services commemorating the founding of the congregation will be held at 7:30 in the evening with Rev. Maxwell Dawes, DD, eastern secretary of the United Church of Canada. The present minister of the church is Rev. Levi Mahaney.

St. Peters Bay was one of the earliest Scottish settlements on the Island where in 1775 a large group of immigrants from Perthshire arrived to take up life in a new land and build their homes. Still another group from Morayshire settled at Cavendish and a third group from Dumfriesshire made homes for themselves in the Georgetown area.

In 1784 when the war between Great Britain and the American Union came to an end some Loyalists arrived and settled at Bedeque.

Many of the settlers before coming to the Island were connected with the Presbyterian Church in Scotland and to some the privilege of attending divine service was denied them for almost 20 years after their arrival.

It was actually not until 1791 that Rev. James MacGregor paid his first visit to the Island settlements. He was a missionary of the Presbyterian Church in the old country.

When Dr. MacGregor arrived on the Island he found that only two clergymen—one a Roman Catholic priest and the other a Church of England minister—were ministering to the spiritual needs of the whole population.

Occasional visit of Dr. MacGregor continued until 1800 when Rev. Mr. Urquhart, a minister of the Church of Scotland arrived. He made his headquarters at Princetown.

Premier Says No Changes Anticipated

This province does not plan to take over collection of corporation income taxes, Premier Walter R. Shaw said yesterday in referring to Prime Minister Diefenbaker's proposal that the provinces distribute university grants from the federal government. The proposal was made in Ottawa Thursday.

"We will go along as we are now without embracing the new scheme," the Premier said as he added it was his impression it was an optional proposal.

The collection of corporation income taxes is apparently an integral part of the Prime Minister's proposal. At present only Ontario and Quebec collect these taxes and it is believed the new scheme is directed towards Quebec which has long objected to university grants because it considers them a federal invasion of provincial affairs.

The inter-province ferry service between Wood Islands, P.E.I. and Caribou, N.S., will terminate for this year on Tuesday, Dec. 15th.

The announcement was made Thursday by Capt. Claud R. Hunter, president of Northumberland Ferries Ltd.

For the past two months only one ferry, the S.S. Charles Dunning has been operating. The S.S. Charles Dunning was laid-up pending completion of work in connection with docks at the Caribou terminal.

The ferries began their 1959 schedule on the first of May.

Steps Taken To Ban Poultry Hormone Use

WASHINGTON (AP)—The federal government Thursday announced steps to halt the use in poultry of a fattening hormone suspected of causing cancer.

Welfare Secretary Arthur S. Flemming outlined a voluntary program to remove from the market birds treated with the synthetic hormone called diethylstilbestrol, or stilbestrol.

Last month, the welfare secretary warned against some cranberries found contaminated with a weed killer thought to produce cancer. A government - industry

testing program then was put into effect to screen out the tainted berries.

Flemming told a press conference Thursday's action was taken because stilbestrol induces cancer in test animals when it is included in their diet over comparatively long periods of time.

He said minute residues to the chemical have been found in market poultry. The residues have been confined to the skins, livers and kidneys of the slaughtered birds, Fleming added, and none was found in the white or dark meat.

Therefore, food and drug administrator George P. Larrick said, a housewife with a chicken in her refrigerator could feel safe she discards the skin, liver and kidneys.
