ever comes when my hon. friend the leader of the Opposition gets into power, he might be glad to have the opportunity of imposing a sales tax to pay for his free school books and those cattle schemes which he has been talking about."

Agriculture

Replying to the Opposition claim that the Government had failed to give leadership in agriculture, Premier Jones maintained that the policies followed by the Department refuted this charge. "This Government at no time could prevent people changing-over from livestock to potato farming," he added. "If we did that we would be called Socialists. But we have always advised people to stick to mixed farming. "Those farmers who have stuck to five or ten acres of potatoes and kept up their livestock are not in a bad way. It is only the people who have been specializing in potatoes, and owe immense sums for fertilizer, who are in trouble."

He pointed out that at present the potato situation has eased and that there are fewer than 3,000 carloads in the Province, as against over 4,000 carloads at this period last year.

He went on to cite the encouragement given by the Government to exhibitions. Assistance is being given to the Provincial Exhibition in an expansion scheme involving \$156,000, and it is proposed to raise this another \$50,000. There will be a big developments there when a hangar will be moved from the airport to accommodate all sorts of indoor activities. The Provincial Government is paying one-third of this cost, and the Dominion Government one-third.

With regard to livestock encouragement, the Premier said there is already an improvement plan under which breeders can borrow money for three years for purebred stock. The banks are anxious to lend this money, but so far our farmers have taken over 80 percent of their loans to buy machinery.

"Why not put these loans to improving their livestock?" he asked. "The leader of the Opposition is suggesting something that is already in effect. The fault is not where he says it is."

Farm Training Neglected

The fault, the Premier believed, is in the farming communities not taking advantage of the opportunities for agricultural education.

Something must be done to impress on them that agriculture is a real business. "Most of the education here teaches otherwise—that it is better to go out and get a white collar job. They are too academically minded."

He instanced the technical classes which are filled to overflowing, while the agricultural courses are being poorly attended.

The Premier also referred to the regular attendance of many people from rural communities at hockey matches in the city, "paying \$1.50 to sit in the rink two or three times a week." If there is a scarcity of money among farmers, as Mr. Bell had claimed, it would be better for these people to stay away from the rink and purchase a couple of cows instead.

One of his endeavours if he remained in office much longer, the Premier said, would be to see that more agricultural training is given in the schools and colleges. He went on to cite the outstandingly high scores made by Island boys.

roughly \$2,000,000—would have enabled a balanced budget if it had been in force for the full fiscal year, the Premier said.

Revenue for the year is estimated at \$40,714,128, compared to \$36,778,902 in actual revenue last year. Expenditures are estimated at \$38,855,745, compared to \$34,641,088.

Teachers Salaries

Referring to the estimates of expenditure in the Education Department—up \$839,000—the Premier referred in length to the recent demands for increased teachers salaries.

"Everybody would be delighted to see teachers get more money," he said.

But the Province now was paying 55.7 percent of the entire cost.

Claims At Ottawa

With regard to pressing Island claims at Ottawa, also referred to in the Opposition amendment, the Premier maintained that the Government had done more in this respect than was ever done in the history of the Province. He anticipated that the report of the Royal Commission on Transportation would be available shortly, and he had been told that the recommendations in it will be advantageous to this Province, due to the strong representations made before the Commission.

This Province had also joined in making strong protests against the railway freight rate increase, which had resulted in delaying the railways application and had saved between \$30,000,000 and \$36,000,000 to the Maritimes in freight rates during the interim.

The Premier dealt at some length with the Land Purchase loans, dating back to Confederation which the Government has been pressing strongly through the Attorney General, Hon. Mr. Darcy, and on which over \$40,000 a year is being claimed.
