

# Cubs Defeat Phillies 7-2 Indians Drop Boston

CHICAGO (AP) — Billy Williams homered in his 27th game and Don Kessinger collected two singles and a double leading Chicago Cubs to a 7-2 victory over Philadelphia Tuesday.

The Cubs broke a 1-1 tie in the fifth on Kessinger's run-producing double. Williams connected off loser Jim Bunning in the sixth.

An error, a wild pitch and four hits, including Glen Beckert's single, enabled the Cubs to score four times in the eighth. The safety extended Beckert's batting streak to 17 games.

Ferguson Jenkins, who allowed only three hits over the first eight innings, collected his third victory against seven defeats. He was relieved by Bob Hendley in the ninth.

Clay Dalrymple had a solo homer for the Phillies.

CLEVELAND (AP) — Max Alvis and Chico Salmon drove in two runs apiece and Gary Bell pitched a three-hitter, leading Cleveland Indians to a 6-2 victory over Boston Red Sox Tuesday night.

Alvis led off the third inning with his 16th home run and doubled home Rocky Colavito in the fourth. Salmon singled twice, each time scoring Larry Brown.

Bell, 14-11, drove in Joe Arcus with a base-loaded single in the fourth, when the Indians scored three runs and chased Boston starter Hank Fischer. Colavito added his 29th homer in the fifth.

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Houston took advantage of two St. Louis errors and four hits by John Bateman and beat the Cardinals 4-3 Tuesday night.

Nelson Briles, the St. Louis starter, touched off the Astros' two-run outburst in the second inning when he failed to touch first when covering the bag on Lee Maye's grounder. Maye scored on a double by Bateman.

Charley Smith's error, sandwiched between singles by Ron Davis and Joe Morgan, accounted for two more Houston runs in the seventh.

St. Louis scored in the sixth when Lou Brock singled and scored when Chris Zachary walked three successive batters.

Smith doubled in a run in the

ninth and scored on Tito Francona's pinch single.

BALTIMORE (AP) — Dave Johnson drove in two runs and launched another rally with a single, pacing the American League-leading Baltimore Orioles to a 4-1 victory over New York Yankees Tuesday night.

Left-hander Dave McNally, stopped the Yanks on six hits as the Orioles won their fifth straight.

Johnson, who cracked three of Baltimore's 10 hits, knocked in runs with a second-inning single and a fourth-inning ground out. He singled in the sixth and scored on Luis Aparicio's third hit of the game.

Aparicio scored another run in the fifth on a single by Boog Powell, which gave the Oriole first baseman the league RBI lead at 103.

McNally, beating the Yankees for the third time while bringing his record to 13-4, allowed a first-inning homer by Tom Tresh.

NEW YORK (AP) — Ken Boyer's two-run single capped a three-run first-inning rally that gave New York Mets a 3-2 victory over Cincinnati Tuesday night.

Dennis Ribant, 11-6, stopped the Reds on six hits, retiring the first 15 batters to face him. Johnny Edwards led off the reds' sixth with a single for the first Cincinnati base runner.

Boyer's single drove in Ron Hunt, who was hit by a pitch, and Al Luplow, who walked.

Bud Harrelson scored earlier in the inning on a wild pitch. Deron Johnson hit his 23rd homer for the Reds in the seventh and Vada Pinson scored later in the inning on Leo Cardenas' sacrifice fly.

DETROIT (AP) — Don Wert and Bill Freehan drove in three runs apiece and Denny McLain scattered 11 hits en route to his 18th victory as Detroit Tigers pounded Washington 8-2 Tuesday night.

Wert hit a two-run homer in the seventh inning after delivering a run in the second with a force out grounder. Freehan doubled across a run in the second and smacked a two-run homer in the eighth.

The Senators spoiled McLain's shutout bid in the seventh when they scored a run on singles by Don Lock and Paul Casanova and an infield out.

McLain, 18-11, also contributed a pair of singles and knocked in a run while breezing to his fourth straight victory.

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Joe Torre's three-run homer in the eighth inning lifted Atlanta Braves to a 4-1 victory over the National League-leading Pittsburgh Pirates Tuesday night.

Felipe Alou drew a leadoff walk from Pirates southpaw Bob Veale in the eighth and, after Denis Menke sacrificed Alou to second, Veale intentionally walked Hank Aaron. Torre then smacked his 33rd homer over the left field wall.

Pat Jarvis allowed the Pirates only five hits through seven innings, but was relieved by Dick Kelley in the eighth after Jim Pagliaroni started the inning with a single. Kelley and another reliever, Jay Ritchie, choked off the threat, protecting Jarvis' third victory against one loss.

The Braves broke a scoreless deadlock in the seventh, when Rico Carty led off with a single and, two outs later, scored on Bill Woodward's double to right.

The Pirates evened the score with a run in their half of the seventh. Roberto Clemente led off with a single for the second on Willie Stargell's ground out, moved to third on Bill Mazeroski's fly, and scored on Manny Mota's single.

# Willie Davis' Hot Bat Helps Dodgers In Race

NEW YORK (AP) — Pitching has been credited with helping Los Angeles Dodgers remain in contention for the National League pennant.

But Willie Davis has been in there pitching, too—with his bat.

The fleet centerfielder has been the club's batting star the past two weeks. Over the past 10 games, he's collected 21 hits in 44 times at bat, a 477 pace, and lifted his average 17 points to .295, the highest among the team's regulars.

Davis had three hits, including his fourth homer in the past 10 games, as Los Angeles downed San Francisco 4-1 and moved to within 1½ games of first place Pittsburgh Pirates Monday.

The 26-year-old outfielder hit only 238 in 142 games last season. His best among six big league years was in 1964 when he batted .294.

CONTINUE CLOUTING Cincinnati's Pete Rose and Pittsburgh's Matty Alou, the league leader, also continued their productive hitting last week.

Rose has raised his average 20 points to .315 while batting safely in his last 14 games. He

has had 31 hits in 62 tries, a .500 gait, and climbed into seventh place in the batting race.

The Pirates' Alou gained 10 points to .348 last week and opened a 19-point lead over his brother, Felipe Alou of Atlanta. Felipe's runnerup .329 is followed by Pittsburgh's Roberto Clemente, the defending champ, .324, and Rich Allen, Philadelphia, .319.

ROBINSON NO. 1 Frank Robinson, the former National Leaguer with Cincinnati, continues to make a strong run for the American League triple crown. The Baltimore slugger is No. 1 in batting with .316 and home runs with 43. He is deadlocked with teammate Boog Powell for the lead in runs batted in. Each has 102. The figures include Monday's games.

Robinson gained four points by collecting 12 hits in 32 attempts in last week's games. Minnesota's Tony Oliva, batting litleholder the last two seasons, held second place at .310. Al Kaline of Detroit is third at .296.

Hank Aaron of Atlanta remained in the NL top spot in homers with 37. He is tied with Clemente for the RBI lead at 106.

# Brewer Attempts To Join Canadian National Team

O'Shea, a high-scoring forward, announced Tuesday he will join the nationals but Hay's future is uncertain.
