time Major Hockey League Trainor again played heads up hockey for the Islanders both at centre and on defence.

The hockey trail for Bucko goes back to the Junior Royals of pre-war years. Trainor was then a strong, young right winger in his teens playing with what were probably the best junior teams this City ever produced.

In 1939 the War interrupted a bright hockey future for Bucko. Shortly after the outbreak he enlisted in the army and served overseas for five years. During his stay in the army he suffered a knee injury that has hampered him throughout his hockey career.

The year following the war he joined Moncton Hawks of the Big Four League and started his climb up the hockey ladder. The following year he played in the United States League.

He returned to the St. Paul of the United States League in the fall of the next year and proceeded to have his best season. Before it was over he was playing with the New York Rangers.

The next year he returned to the Rangers but injuries sent him to the Rangers number one farm team at New Haven. This was his tough luck year. First he suffered a broken jaw and then a knee injury recurred keeping him on the sidelines for a considerable length of time.

During the next summer the Islanders Hockey Club was formed and Bucko remained at home to spark the team. As centreman between Walt Pawlyshyn and Bruno Favero he turned in performances that will be remembered long after the hockey league is gone.

Bucko will work out with the Islanders during their training sessions. Fans will be hoping that he may yet have a change of heart and lineup with the team for the coming season.

Last year in a much faster Maritime

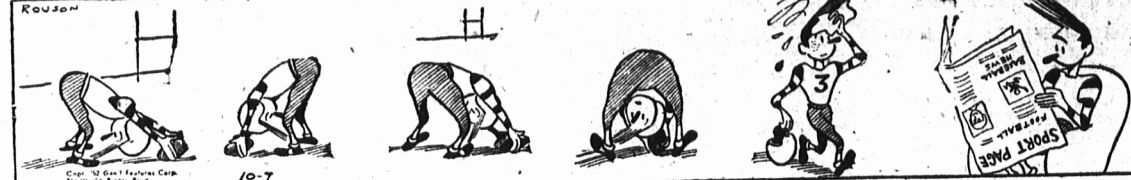

The Brooklyn Dodgers will move into the final World Series game this afternoon with pitching, the big factor that was supposed to work against them, riding in their favor. Strictly on their mound staff alone the Yankees entered the series 8-5 favorites over the Dodgers but now that the seventh and final game has been reached the shoe appears to be on the other foot. Manager Charlie Dressen of the Dodgers has Joe Black rested and ready for today's encounter while Casey Stengel of the Yankees finds his big two of Vic Raschi and Allie Reynolds over-worked and tired.

No one made any mistake in estimating the value of the Yankees mound staff. The Yankee pitchers have done all that could be asked of any corps of hurlers. The big mistake was made in the under-estimation of the Brooklyn flingers. In view of their late season performance, Billy Ives, Carl Erskine and Preacher Roe have more than come through in a big way for their team. Joe Black, of course, has been a star all year and although there was some doubt about his ability to make out as a starting pitcher he has showed that he is a star whether or whenever he is used.

There will be a lot of pressure on the rookie pitcher this afternoon when he faces the Yankees for the third time in the series. He has pitched two brilliant games for his skipper already and if he comes through today he will make his manager as well as himself look good. Dressen may have played it smart when he started Black Saturday and so have him ready for today while Stengel may have made a poor move in starting Blackwell Sunday instead of Raschi. The latter had three days rest and should have been ready for Sunday. If he had pitched and the games ended the way they did he would certainly be effective for a few innings relief today. As it is he will probably have to work anyway.

At this writing we're not sure who will be starting for the Yankees although early news reports believe it will be Allie (The Chief) Reynolds. If it is Reynolds will be making his fourth appearance in the series and it seems to be asking an awful lot of a 33 year old pitcher. Stengel could start Lopat and hope that he would hold the fort for five innings. Then he could depend on Reynolds and possibly Raschi to take care of the last four frames.

After six series games the teams have shown that there is little to choose between them. Veteran reporters have claimed that it is one of the best series they ever witnessed and there's no one who will argue with them too much on that. The pitching has been good and the hitting has been long and judging by the descriptions of the plays the fielding particularly in the outfield has been outstanding.

Whatever way it goes today matters little to us. The Dodgers are to win it we hope it will be the result of a home run by Gil Hodges. There is no player we would sooner see get a round trip today than the Dodgers first baseman. He is a terrific baseball player and has been all season but he has been in a tough batting slump throughout the series.

We were sorry to see Dressen lift Hodges for pinch hitter Rocky Nelson in the ninth yesterday. We doubt if anyone has pinch hit for Hodges since he came into the majors. During the season he hit 32 homers and led the Dodgers with RBIs. In addition he sparked their drive to the pennant in September. Our admiration of Hodges possibly goes a little farther than the fact he is a good ball player. Judging from all we have

Little Change Reported In Detroit Red Wing Team

DETROIT, Oct. 6 — (AP) — The cast will be much the same when Detroit Red Wings skate out after their fifth straight National Hockey League title this season. Only two familiar faces are missing.

The change is in the Production Line with the departure of centre Sid Abel for coaching duties with Chicago Black Hawks. And that's where it could hurt Red Wings the most — but the Stanley Cup champions banking on former New York Ranger Reggie Sinclair to fill the gap.

The other absentee when Rangers open at home Thursday night against Rangers is defenseman Leo Reize who sent to Rangers in return for the 27-year-old Sinclair from Lachine, Que., who learned his hockey at McGill University and in the Senior Quebec League.

Sinclair, who scored 30 points with Rangers last year, is the long new face.

So Detroit's famed Production Line will no longer read Abel, Lindsay and Howe. It will be Sinclair, Lindsay and Howe.

Manager Jack Adams and coach Tommy Ivan could have done some shuffling with their No. 2 and No. 3 lines. But they decided to keep those forward walls intact and move newcomer Sinclair in between right wing Goro. Howe and left wing Ted Lindsay.

The others in the Production Line are not question marks. Howe, winner of the Hart Trophy last year, led the league in scoring for the last two seasons with 86 each time. Lindsay was second in the 1951-52 season with 69.

The No. 2 line will be: Right wing Metro Prosvet, centre Alex Delvecchio and left wing John Wilson. Glen Skov will centre the No. 3 line with Tony Leswick on right and Marty Pavelchic patrolling the other lane. Utility centre will be Larry Wilson and utility wingman Vic Stastuk.

The Wings' five defencemen are Red Kelly, Bob Goldham, Ben Witt, Marcel Pronovost and Larry Zeidel.

And, of course, the goaltender will be Terry Sawchuk. No. 1 in the league last year. He saved up only 133 goals in 70 games for a 1.90 av-

Edge Brooklyn Dodgers 3-2 In Sixth Game

BROOKLYN, Oct. 6 — (AP) — Vic Raschi and Allie Reynolds tamed Brooklyn Dodgers with an 11-strikeout job today to send this homer-happy World Series into a seventh game with a 3-2 victory by New York Yankees.

Two tremendous home runs by Duke Snider weren't enough to match the desperate Yankees, who fought back to tie the series for the third time.

The final game will be played at Ebbets Field tomorrow with the possibility that Reynolds and Joe Black of the Dodgers may meet for a third time. Black was the victor in the first game but Reynolds triumphed in the fourth. Both are right-handed.

Yogi Berra and Mickey Mantle ripped into 22-year-old Billy Loes for homers and Raschi provided the other runs with a single that bounced off Loes' left ankle and rolled into short right field, scoring Gene Woodling in the two-run seventh.

Manager Casey Stengel, struggling to keep alive his dreams of a fourth straight world championship, called on Reynolds to save the eighth inning.

Snider's second homer of the day and fourth of the series-tying records held by Lou Gehrig and Babe Ruth — slashed the Yank lead to 3-2 in the eighth. After George Shuba rammed a two-out double to the wall in left-center, old Casey brought on his super chief from the bullpen.

With the tying run on second and one out, Reynolds worked on Roy Campanella and poured a third strike past his swining bat.

The Yankee ace, coming back after his brilliant four-inning shut-out Saturday, also turned a pinch-hitter Nelson to start the ninth. Then he weakened momentarily.

Carl Furillo walked on a 3-2 count and Andy Pafo ran it up to 3-1 before he popped to Phil Rizuto. Reynolds squashed Dodger hopes by making Billy Cox roll to Gil McDougald for the final out.

The homers by Snider, Berra and Mantle brought the series' total to 14, high for any world series.

Raschi pitched a brilliant game, striking out nine men before he faltered in the eighth, and walking only one. With the help of the Chief he received credit for his fifth series win.

Deserved Win

The 33-year-old right-hander deserved the win. Three times he had Gil Hodges swinging like a garden gate. Hodges is hitless in 17 tries in the series. Shuba went down swinging twice and Cox, Loes, Carl Furillo and Jackie Robinson each took one strikeout.

Lock in a 0-0 duel with Loes for five innings, Raschi gave way first pitch of the sixth over the right field screen. The ball sailed over the wall some 325 feet away and bounced gaily into a parking lot across the street.

The lead was short-lived, for Berra led off the Yank seventh by driving a 2-2 pitch over the same right-field barrier. Furillo, in right field, barely bothered to turn his head because the ball was ticketed from the time it left the bat.

When Woodling followed with a ground single over second base and Loes was in trouble. Irv Noren worked the count to 1-1. As Loes stretched and looked toward first base, the ball popped out of the webbing of his glove and fell to the ground for an automatic walk.

Noren eventually struck out. Raschi came through with a sharp single off Loes' left knee into short right scoring Woodling. If it had not been for the balk, Woodling would not have scored.

Brooklyn's cause looked dark as Raschi continued to pour it on in the seventh although Stengel had Reynolds warming up after Loes singled with two out.

The teams came to in the last of the eighth with the Yankees ahead 3-1 after Mantle rocketed a 385-foot lead-off homer into the lower stands in left-center.

Then the Dodgers came to life. With one gone, Snider poled a home run over the right-field scoreboard.

Raschi got Robinson to left field first pitch to Woodling in left field but Shuba smashed out a double.

That was all for big Vic and Reynolds came in for bases on hits. A ball, two strikes, a foul and then the shifftero—that did it.

Annoyed by this threat, the Yanks seemed about to break things wide open in the ninth after Reynolds rolled out. McDougald and Rizuto singled to chase Loes and bring Preacher Roe to the mound.

The Preacher, Friday's third-game winner, had trouble with his control and loaded the bases by walking Mantle. Trailing Joe Collins by a 3-1 count, he came

Yankees Favored To Win Series

BROOKLYN, Oct. 6 — (AP) — New York Yankees are favorites to win the seventh and final game of the World Series tomorrow with either Ed Lopat or Allie Reynolds doing the pitching against the Dodgers' Joe Black.

The odds makers made the Yanks the 7-to-6 choice if Lopat goes and 7 1/2-to-6 1/2 if event manager Casey Stengel comes back with Reynolds.
