THE SUMMER SCHOOL OF CORNELL UNIVERSITY.

The seventh summer session of Cornell University will be held from July 5 to August 13, 1898. An announcement of the courses of instruction, just issued, shows that fourteen departments of study will be represented, in addition to the courses in the College of Law, and that, in the aggregate, more than 70 courses will be offered. Particularly valuable opportunities will be found for doing university work in university buildings and under the direction of university instructors, in the languages, ancient and modern, and the natural sciences, physics and mathematics, chemistry, botany, etc. Other courses are offered in philosophy, elocution, drawing, designing, experimental engineering, etc. The surroundings of Ithaca are considered by many travellers to be of almost unequalled beauty and picturesqueness, and made the famed campus "far above Cayuga's waters," an inspiring place of study in summer as well as in winter.

ANOTHER CASE FOR RECONSIDERATION.

(St. John Sun.)

The bargain now proposed with the Drummond Railway company is \$600,000 better to the country than the one which Mr. Blair tried to force through parliament last year. It is still far too bad a bargain for the country. For we have still no statement of an improved bargain with the Grand Trunk company. The contract made last year required the payment of \$100,000 a year for the railway to be used in common and for the Intercolonial share of the terminus. As the government now borrows money, this is equal to a cash payment of \$3,400,000. The total value of this railway and terminus is estimated by Mr. Schreiber and Blair at \$3,750,000—that is \$2,500,000 for the station, freight house, part of the work shops, and that part of the yard used in common. This means that the Intercolonial assumes \$3,400,000 of the burden of providing property for the joint occupation, while the Grand Trunk assumes \$350,000. Now the Grand Trunk business handled at Montreal will be from five to ten times that handled there by the Intercolonial.

Thus we see that one of the joint owners bears about ten times the burden that the other does. Also, one of the roads makes ten times as much use as the other of the property. But the railway which makes ten times as much use is not the one that pays ten times as much of the cost.
