

B. I. S. Meeting Last Night

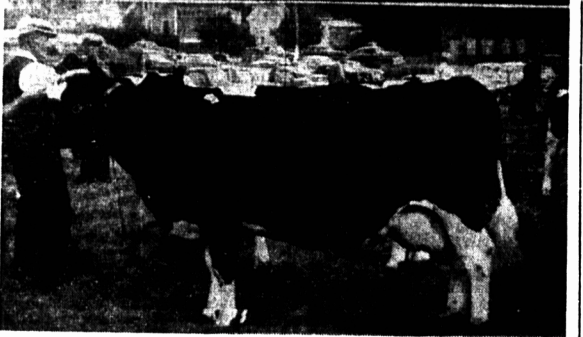
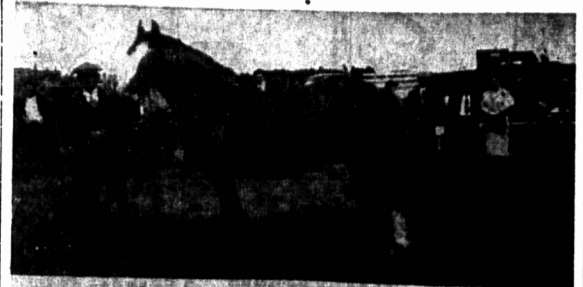
Under the chairmanship of president Thomas MacAvinn, the members of the Benevolent Irish Society held a highly successful business meeting last night.

Concluding Sessions Yesterday Of Teachers Convention At Montague

...The second and last day of the teachers convention at Montague was opened yesterday morning with the roll call.

After the roll call Mrs. Ina Hickox read the minutes of the previous day's meeting which were approved and adopted as read.

The guest speaker for the morning session was Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assistant director of education. Mr. MacKenzie's talk was concerned generally with the school curriculum and specifically with the particular books necessary for each individual course.

The speaker mentioned that the Department of Education was working hand in hand with the Teachers Federation and there are in existence committees, made up of a good cross-section of the Province's teachers, who decide the books most desirable for the course of studies in the schools.

Mr. MacKenzie dealt with some of the parents' attitudes towards books and some of the fallacies which they believe to be truths. Many parents wonder why the Department of Education changes the books used in different courses as frequently as they do. Mr. MacKenzie explained that P. E. I., because of its size, has to follow the changes endorsed by the bigger provinces. The book printing companies are not anxious to print a small quantity of books on account of the cost involved and as a consequence if P. E. I. insisted on the older books they would, in all probability, cost more than the newer ones.

He mentioned also the new science books and said that equipment which can be used in demonstrations of the experiments contained in them will soon be available for half the normal market price.

After Mr. MacKenzie's talk an enjoyable sing-song was conducted by Mrs. MacLure. Following the sing-song a number of questions were drawn from the ques-

tion box, some of which provoked a great deal of spirited discussion.

AFTERNOON SESSION

The afternoon session was opened by a short talk given by Mr. George Andrew, athletic director at P. W. C., on the purpose and place of athletics and physical education in schools today. Then Mr. Andrew moved to the outdoors where, with the aid of a number of teachers, he demonstrated a few games which children can safely play in the school's yard and which can be enjoyed immensely by the participants.

Following Mr. Andrew's demonstration Mr. Derrill MacGulgan gave a very enlightening and interesting demonstration of methods of teaching intermediate arithmetic.

Nominations of new slate of officers was next on the agenda and in the following elections Mrs. Marion Johnstone was elected president, succeeding Mr. Joseph Scully. Mrs. Zita Boudreault was elected vice-president and Miss Claire Delorie secretary.
