An excellent help for carache is to lay over a stove-plate, which is very warm, a thick cotton cloth, which has just been wrung out of water. A steam immediately rises, over which the aching ear should be held. The steam permeates all the cavities as no other remedy will, and relief is quickly experienced.

Children should not be allowed to sleep with the head raised high on pillows. It makes them round-shouldered. English children generally sleep with a pillow that barely raises the head from the bed. In this, with direction as to sitting straight, gives them graceful, erect figures.

Mothers, make companions of your girls. It will keep you young and makes them happy. Those daughters who act towards their mothers as younger sisters, give their honor and respect as well, are supremely fortunate. For they enjoy the pleasures of sort of camaraderie, and one that will keep their life bright and cheerful, and their consciences quiet, and they would be without it.

Never teach false modesty. Sydney Smith wrote: "How exceedingly absurd to teach a girl that beauty is of no value, dress of no use. Beauty is of her own, and dress is of her own, and happiness in life may often depend upon a new gown or a becoming bonnet; if she has five grains of common sense, she will find this out. The great thing is to teach her their proper value."

A lace and muslin collar, shaped like the spoke, and buttoning at the back, placed over an ordinary frock, at once makes it dressy, as many mothers have satisfactorily proved.

Teach your daughters that, in dressing, simplicity and grace are one and the same. Teach her that the whiteness of her gown should be expressive of her purity of character; that the flowers at her belt are but second-hand truth that she is a sweet human flower of God's planting in gardens of the earth; that the soft lace at her throat is suggestive of fancies fine and delicate as itself.

Teach your children to be too confidential, even with intimate friends. Teach them that one seldom gives one's family affairs into another's keeping without having to regret it. Point out the numbers of other things to talk about, on which they may be as friendly and speakable as they like, so long as they hold sacred what concerns the absolutely private family affairs of other party.

The Russian Face Bath.
The principle of the Russian bath for the face is to bathe it with such hot water that it will make one jump every time it is applied, and then, a minute later, to splash it with cold water. The reaction which this causes in the blood will cause the skin to glow and tingle with warmth. Then it should be wiped dry with a towel. Day by day the skin will grow firmer, and the wrinkles will gradually disappear. The use of hot and cold water for the face is important in any way. Grease and dirt which settle in the pores of the skin, but if hot water be used first, and then cold, the dirt will be removed and the skin tingle and freshen. Every day grease will settle in the skin when the face is washed only with h. r. cold water and soap, and this alone, in time, injures the face as if it were a child. It should never bathe in the face in hard water if a fair complexion is desired. The water should be softened with a little borax, or a few drops of ammonia. When the face is very hot it should not be lathered. Wait until it cools off a little.

Mothers should be Happy.
Women should do their utmost to see that the childhood of their boys and girls should be a happy as outward circumstances render possible. Every mother should make a study in the art of creating happiness in her children. "But I can't be happy," said a boy from books; "I can't be happy because of a de-vice—misfortune. Poverty is no bar to its attainment. Happiness at all times is a pearl not of the Indian, but of the European ocean." But the mother who tries to have "as to go to heaven every day" will be sure to bring down and impart it to her little ones—Archdeacon Farrar in the Home.

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ITEMS OF REAL INTEREST.

A Collection of queer Things and Odd Happenings in Europe.
In England there is one divorce to 577 marriages, in France one to 87 marriages, and in the city of Paris one to thirteen marriages. Paris seems determined to maintain its rank as a fast city.

A lady of Neuhaldensleben, Germany, who died last month, has bequeathed the sum of 5,000 marks to a subaltern officer who, during the battle of Mars-la-Tour, two years ago, killed her wounded brother from the field.

After the death of a "pauper" in Siberia it was found that he had bequeathed a collection of 8,000 marks, \$2,000 in cash, 55 pairs of pants, 109 shirts, nearly all new, 25 undershirts, 89 coats, 23 pairs of socks and 52 hats and caps. No soap.

Karl Wesselske, an actor, became suddenly and violently insane a few days ago while impersonating a sane man confined in a lunatic asylum on the boards of the National Theatre, at Berlin, Germany. His case is considered hopeless.

Lately forty horses were started in a long distance race at Warsaw, in Austrian Poland. Thirty-six of the poor beasts came to a finish by death, and the other four are in an exceedingly sorry condition. The cruel sportsmen will be prosecuted.

It is reported from Paris that the aeronaut Capazza, dropping from an elevation of 4,000 feet, has succeeded in guiding his parachute exactly to the spot previously designated by him. Hence flighty Paris journalists now hope soon to take a fly. The messenger will be sure to take many a drop before the fly.

On Pentecost day, at Brun, Austria, a journeyman baker and his sweetheart found death together in the waters of the Schwarzwasser, having sought it because they were too poor to marry. Quite lately a lottery ticket owned by the drowned man drew a prize of 20,000 gulden, 20,000; the money has been paid to his mother.

Three months ago a servant woman at Pilsen, Austria, drowned her two-year-old baby. During her incarceration she confessed to having previously killed a four-year-old child—both because "they wept for hunger and cried for bread." The murderer was condemned to death, but the Emperor has commuted the sentence to fifteen years' imprisonment.

It is rather odd that Mr. Schenk, former President of the Swiss Republic, and now a member of the Federal Council (the Swiss Federal Council performs the functions which in the United States are allotted to the Cabinet) should be over and over again injured by a passing carriage while in the act of giving alms to a deaf-mute mendicant—that he was then blind and deaf to the approach of the carriage.
