HALIFAX (CP)— Cecilia Long of Toronto, first woman president of the Federation of Canadian Advertising, Monday night warned that Canadian women intend to demand a greater share in the control of business.

Miss Long told the ladies night meeting of the Halifax Ad-Sales Club that women now spend 90 cents of every dollar the business earns, own 70 per cent of all private wealth, control 65 per cent of all savings accounts and pay 40 per cent of all property tax.

She said the day is coming when women will say "if I own things, why can't I help run them."
