KEROSENE OIL.—Eight cents per cask is charged for storage in the City Kerosene Oil Warehouse.

REV. A. BRAY, of Montreal, announces the establishment of a weekly newspaper in January. It is to be called the Canadian Spectator.

BUILDING operations are being pushed forward very rapidly in St. John before the winter sets in. The Building Inspector has his hands full.

Two firms failed in Montreal on the 20th. Their liabilities, added together, made \$977,000. The assets are not known. The Consolidated Bank loses from \$15,000 to \$20,000.

The Patriot is very nervous over a report that Sitting Bull is encamped within thirty or forty miles of the Battleford, the seat of the Government of the North-West Territories, and the residence of Governor Laird.

ANTICOSTI.—A number of families from Newfoundland, who recently settled at Fox Bay, Anticosti, have applied to the Dominion and Quebec Governments for relief, fearing starvation the coming winter for lack of provisions.

ENGLISH GOODS.—Eleven car loads of English goods and 623 packages for sundry stations, passed out from Halifax over the Intercolonial Railway on the 20th; 1294 barrels of flour, 16 carloads of sundries, and 873 packages for different stations, passed into Halifax at the same time.

THE FISHERY COMMISSION.—On the 21st Mr. Thomson, on behalf of the Imperial Government, closed the British case before the Fishery Commission, after speaking for ten hours. Mr. Thomson's argument and thoroughness is highly spoken of. The Commission adjourned until tomorrow (Saturday), when it is expected the award will be given.

THE PARIS EXPOSITION.—The Government steamer Newfield sailed from Montreal on the 21st with Dominion exhibits for the Paris Exhibition. The representation of manufactures at the Exhibition will be fair, except rubber goods, of which there is none; and stoves and cabinet ware, of which there is a small show. Machinery of all kinds are poorly represented. The principal exhibits are from Ontario.

DISASTERS.—A despatch from Queenstown, Nov. 7th, says, Captain Carrington, of the Eden, reports that on October 28th, in latitude 47 N., longitude 39 W., spoke the barque Willie McLaren, from this port, with all sails, except one, lost. She arrived at Queenstown on the 7th inst.—The Orlando, Kickham, from Prince Edward Island, arrived in Belfast on the 8th, making water. She went on the dock for repairs.

The Military Situation.

NEW YORK, NOV. 23.

A Russian dispatch says that Grand Duke Nicholas entered Kars on Monday, and received the homage of the inhabitants.

The interest of the war now centres on Plevna, Rustchuck and the Lom, where important movements are progressing.

Since the fall of Kars, one party at the Russian headquarters urges that the Turks be stripped of Roumelia, and that the Russian troops make a dash at Schipka and the neighboring passes of the Balkans making the 60,000 men now concentrated at Tirnova available for that purpose, as soon as Mehemet Ali makes a movement for the relief of Plevna. On the other hand there is a disposition to await the movement of the Turks, fearing Mehemet's tactics for the relief of Plevna may result in his threatening the Czarowitch's communications with the crossings of the Danube.

There is no news from Plevna, except that a Bucharest dispatch states that a regular bombardment of the place has at last been opened.

WAR NEWS.

LONDON, NOV. 21.

Seventeen thousand men from the Kars army are to be detached to assist in the siege of Plevna.

General Melikoff started suddenly from Erzeroum on Sunday. He will take command of the besieging forces there.

At a council of war, Philippoff, a prominent general, recommended that a corps be left to cover Erzeroum, while the remainder of the army pushed through Asia Minor to Scutari.

MANCHESTER, NOV. 21.

The Guardian's Pera correspondent telegraphs:

"We have just heard of the capture of Kars. The fall of Erzeroum is expected to follow. The Porte now appears desirous of entertaining peace. Server Pasha, Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Mahmond Damad are said to be favorable to peace."

LONDON, NOV. 21.

A Russian official despatch claims that the Turks, after a stubborn engagement lasting from nine o'clock in the morning until six o'clock in the evening, were everywhere repulsed, but admits that the Russian outposts were temporarily driven in. Both accounts agree that the Turks, after severe fighting, temporarily occupied and burned Pjogas.

The Russians state that so far 85 of their wounded have been brought in.

Suleiman Pasha has arrived at Rustchuck.

VIENNA, NOV. 21.

A Bucharest despatch to the Political Correspondence reports that the Roumanian batteries yesterday sunk a Turkish steamer or above Labove Kalafat.

BUCHAREST, NOV. 21.

The Roumanian (official paper) announces that the Roumanians captured Rabbova this morning, after three days engagement. The Turks fled towards Lom, Palanka and Widdin, with the Roumanians in pursuit. Simultaneously with the capture of Rabbova, the Roumanian division crossed the Danube opposite that town.

LONDON, NOV. 21.

There was heavy fighting on Lom on Monday. The Turkish official despatch claims that a strong Turkish force while making reconnaissance carried Russian positions on Metchikah heights at Pirigos, and near Jouchiflich, destroying at the first named place seventy casemates filled with ammunition and provisions. The Russians lost 1,400 men.

The Russian attack on Kadi-Koi was repulsed.

Shipping Intelligence.

THE S. S. THAMES.—The S. S. Thames whose arrival at St. John's Nfld., disabled, has been reported, left London on the 20th of October for Quebec with a number of passengers and a general cargo. She experienced terrific weather on the passage out, and lost overboard her second and third officers and one seaman, during a storm. Her machinery was somewhat deranged, and one boiler injured, so that she had to proceed under sail, and made St. John's as the nearest port. Amongst her other injuries, the Thames had her compasses, ventilators, sky-lights and deck-houses swept away by a storm, and lost all her boats. The necessary repairs can be effected at St. John's; the passengers will be transferred to the Nova Scotian, due there to-day, and will be brought to Halifax.

POTATOES FOR LONDON.—Messrs. Peake Bros. & Co. are now loading the barque Ethel Blanche with potatoes for the London market.

A LIST of two hundred and forty defaulters in the payment of city taxes has been handed over, and will be sued for in the Small Debt Court.

THE steamer M. A. Starr sailed for Halifax yesterday evening. The Acadia sailed for Boston at 5 o'clock, with freight and passengers.

THE trials before the Stipendiary Magistrate this morning were principally for drunkenness and corner loafing. There were fifteen cases altogether, including two larcenies.

ON Wednesday evening last Mr. Thos. Curran, lumber merchant of Miramichi, was either robbed of or lost \$800 in cash and \$100 in promissory notes. Mr. Curran states that on Wednesday evening, after paying a bill at the store of Mr. Charles Robertson, he proceeded to Pownal Street where he met two sailors named Gillis and McMahon. He had some drinks with the parties named in Mr. James Currie's, where he left about ten o'clock in their company and proceeded to the house of Robert Minard. Shortly after his arrival at Minard's he missed his pocket book. Search was made, but without success. A suspicion was laid on Gillis and McMahon. They were arrested and brought before the Magistrate this morning. The evidence yet produced is slight. They were remanded for eight days.
