Rights in Central America.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The Globe airs the ultra-jingoistic opinions of which it has almost a monopoly. Taking for its text the reference to the Isthmian canal, it declares that Washington is "not entitled to override our treaty-secured rights in any parts of Central America, except with the consent of our Government. The Hay-Pauncefote compromise goes farthest in extreme conciliation and represents this country's very last word, and the United States must either accept the proposal as it stands or abide by the ruling of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty, however embarrassing its provisions may be to American Imperialism."

Southern Industrial Convention.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 6.—Dressed in his robes of office, Cardinal Gibbons opened yesterday's session of the Southern Industrial convention. Dr. Lyman Hall, president of the Georgia School of Technology, spoke at the morning session. A paper was presented on foreign and coastwise trade as a necessary factor in southern industrial development, by N. B. Kelly, secretary of the Trades League of Philadelphia.

Foreswore Their Allegiance.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—The first two Afrikaanders to apply for naturalization in the United States district court here got their first papers yesterday. They are Hercules David Viljoen, 41 years old, and Andreas Jacobus Leibenberg, 55 years of age. Both were former residents of Cape Colony. After the papers were read out the two men went before U. S. Commissioner Shields and foreswore allegiance to the Queen of England.

In China.

BERLIN, Dec. 6.—A despatch from Field Marshal Von Waldersee, dated Pekin, Tuesday, Dec. 4, says strong detachments of Chinese regulars, under Gen. Ma, are reported from Shan-Si, to be holding the mountain passes on the frontier of Chi-Li.

We Don't Know.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—J. M. Robertson, who has just returned from South Africa, in a speech at a meeting of the league of liberals, said the people here knew little or nothing of what was going on in South Africa. He further asserted that he himself saw an order of Lord Roberts in July for the burning of forty farms. The Dutch, Mr. Robertson added, are not absolutely alienated.

The Allan Liner Parisian arrived at Halifax at 9 a. m. Wednesday after the roughest voyage of her career. She left Liverpool November 23rd, and met head winds and huge seas which tossed her about like a cork. On the 26th an accident happened to her machinery, and she had to lay for repairs. On December 1st a snap came in the engines and again she was helpless. For twenty-five hours she was driven back by head winds and lost ground rapidly. The passengers were told a hot bath had broken. On the 2nd repairs were finished and the Parisian started for Halifax. She arrived off the harbor at midnight of the 4th, where she was for the third time rendered helpless. However she came into the harbor under her own steam. Her passengers included 20 Canadians returning home from Africa, and Rear Admiral A. K. Bickford, C. M. G., the new commander-in-chief of the Pacific squadron.

TORONTO, Dec. 7.—Fair today. Saturday: East winds, likely to increase in force; becoming unsettled with sleet and rain.

The Boston correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle writes highly concerning Mr. W. E. Stavert who has resigned as manager of the recently established branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia in Boston to become manager of the Bank of New Brunswick. He says the transfer is a great loss to the Bank of Nova Scotia, with which he has been connected twenty years. While with the bank he had established several successful branches, among them those at Jamaica and St. John's. From the latter place Mr. Stavert went to Boston, and had just succeeded in getting the branch in good working order when his services were sought by the Bank of New Brunswick. This was the result of manager Schofield's recent death. The position has a higher salary and greater authority. This bank has no branches, but with Mr. Stavert as manager this condition may be changed. The Boston branch of the Bank of Nova Scotia will now be managed by Mr. John A. Macleod, at present at St. John's, a native of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Stavert was born in Prince Edward Island about 39 years ago, and probably inherits his financial faculty, for his father is manager of the Bank of Summerside. In his departure from Boston the Canadian Club will lose a valued member and officer, for he was treasurer of the Club.
