DOMINION RIFLE ASSOCIATION.—The annual meeting of the Dominion Rifle Association was held at Ottawa on the 20th. Lieut.-Col. Ripstick, M. P., was re-elected president. Senator Botsford was chosen vice-president for New Brunswick; General Laurie, vice-president for Nova Scotia, and Senator McIsaac, vice-president for Prince Edward Island. The Governor-General and General Horner made speeches condemning the use of the Snider rifle and urged the use of the Government to arm the militia with an improved weapon.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.
The Prohibition Question.
OTTAWA, May 22.
The prohibition debate was resumed yesterday. Mr. Mackintosh moved an amendment, referring the matter to a special committee. Mr. Taylor moved an amendment to the amendment favoring prohibition and the taking of a plebiscite. Mr. Davies supported the plebiscite. The debate was very dry, the House being only half full (no pun intended.) A member gives notice of a resolution favoring reference of the question of prohibition to the people at the polls. The prohibition debate adjourned.
Irish Land Purchase.
LONDON, May 22.
The House of Commons last night discussed the Irish Land Purchase Bill. Balfour moved the insertion of a new clause to regulate the distribution of purchase money among different classes of tenants. Healy and Sexton opposed the amendment. Parnell supported it. The clause was carried by 111 to 26.
