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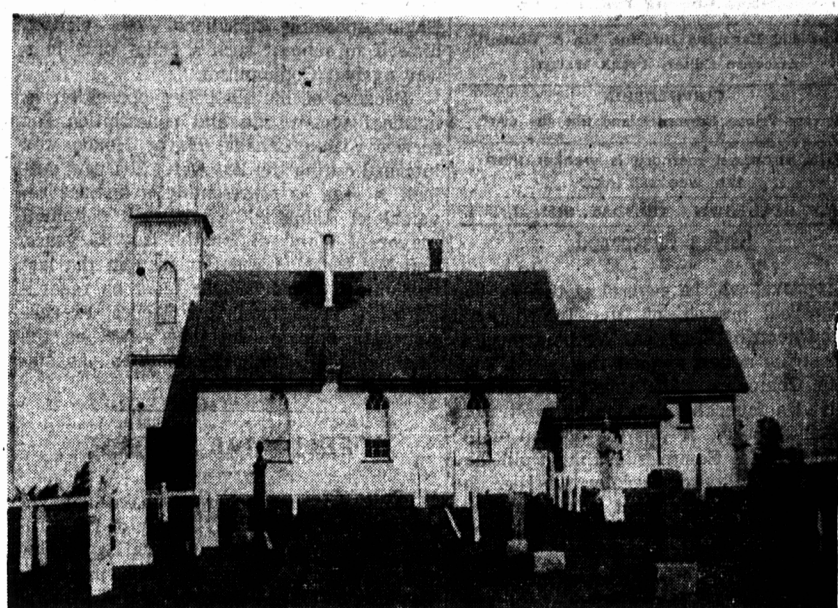
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## Interesting History Attaches To St. Stephen's Church At Irishtown



St. Stephen's Church and Cemetery, Irishtown.

In writing this sketch of St. Stephen's Anglican Church, or, as it was commonly called—"the English Church," we shall say first that it is situated in Irishtown, Queen's County, Prince Edward Island, on the corner of land where the Millman Road joins the Irishtown Road leading to Park Corner to the north side of the Island. The land on which the church stand was set apart for a church and cemetery site by Mr. Thomas Millman under the terms of his lease years before the church was built. He bought the property outright in 1871.

The situation is strategic, being convenient to the different settlements which comprise this part of the New London parish—Sea View, Spring Valley, and Eel Creek. The latter name is now little used, as Burlington, or the Long River Road, has generally supplanted it. This church was opened for Divine worship in March of 1855 during the rectorship of the Reverend William Meek, so that it has nearly reached the century mark.

It is rather a curious fact, but fact it is, that an English church should exist in a settlement called Irishtown. Almost within a stone's throw of the church the following Irish families have lived, but before we name them we shall say that the stone was never thrown: Patrick Brown, James (Martin) Murphy, James (Larry) Murphy, the brothers John and Simon Forristal, Matthias O'Halloran, James Ready and family which included Michael, the egg-buyer, Charles Flynn, and John his brother who made salves and medicines from roots and herbs. These alone would make a creditable St. Patrick's Day parade.

In a further north-easterly direction lived the brothers Richard and Patrick Ready and their families—Michael the blacksmith was a son of Patrick Ready—and the Burke's and Costello's who were still earlier settlers. These good old Irish families and their English neighbors held the Irish clothes and their faiths in mutual respect; the boys and girls attended the same school built directly across the road from St. Stephen's Church, and the friendly relations existed between them.

There were men of education and culture in the settlement in those early days. John Forristal was the first teacher in Irishtown school and he later kept a small store near the school. Richard Ready taught school in Fermoyle, managing his farm at the same time. His was a clever and musical family, and many a happy evening was spent by old and young of the community in that hospitable home where they were entertained with vocal and instrumental music. The late James A. Ready, B.A., of Kensington, was a son.

It seems a great pity that now only one descendant bearing the family name, Willard Brown, grandson of Patrick Brown, is left of all the old Irish stock. The last member of the Ready family sold the homestead in 1932 and moved to another district. One who spent the early days of his life in the Irishtown district and who now lives in Kensington told the writer that he was glad to have had the privilege of growing up in this settlement where neighborly helpfulness and cooperation was always practised.

That this feeling still exists was evidenced lately in the Irishtown Community Hall project when practically all the families in the

school district worked together in every possible way to have the Hall built. It is a modern building, well equipped and a credit to the community.

Now for a little information about the first English settlers whose descendants were later to build St. Stephen's Church. These men were much too busy cutting down the woods, clearing their farms, making a living for their families, usually large ones, to put down much in writing, but by referring to the family Bible and making a bit of research here and there a little has been learned about some of them. One would naturally wonder how these Old Country folk ever heard of this small Island. Possibly some high pressure land agent went among them painting the new colony with its forest and fisheries in glowing colors. So, to improve their situation, as they thought, they came with their wives and families and sweethearts, their grandfather clocks and feather beds, in the holds of sailing vessels.

In 1774 a project headed by one Robert Clark of London brought out a shipload of settlers from England in the Snow Elizabeth. They landed at the harbour and built up a little village of some sixteen log houses along the shore, naming the settlement New London, and the village Elizabethtown. The MacGregor map of 1830 has Elizabethtown marked on it. There were 129 souls all told in the settlement. According to one who made a study of the early days this Clark project was the origin of the Anderson, Adams, Cole and Warren families, the last of whom definitely belonged to the Church of England.

In the Yankee Hill Cemetery overlooking New London Harbour there are two stones with the following inscriptions: "Sacred to the memory of John Adams Sr. and Sarah his wife who emigrated from Hilltown, Derbyshire, England, A. D. 1774. He departed this life 7th of May 1815 aged 81 years." "Sacred to the memory of Sarah Adams who departed this life 3rd of Jan. 1826 aged 94 years. Her two stones were erected by their son Thomas." In the little cemetery in the Sims field a short distance from the Yankee Hill Cemetery is a stone with the following inscription: "Sacred to the memory of John Adams, native of Derbyshire, who departed this life Mar. 16, 1883, and also five children on the right, erected by his son Thomas."

Evidently these two men were father and son. Keith Adams of Burlington, has a deed written on parchment, perfectly preserved, of a sale of 150 acres of land with use of the marshes, made between John Adams and Chief Justice Peter Stewart of Charlottetown in 1805. The purchase price was \$75. Samuel Cunard of Halifax at one time owned parts of Lots 19 and 20. He was an absentee landlord, never having lived on the Island. Settlers who later came to this vicinity leased their farms from the Cunard estate. John Adams never lived on this particular property. His house was somewhere in New London, but according to the family stories they came by boat and cut marsh hay in the summer, putting wooden platforms under little stacks, and on the ice in winter loading the stacks on wood sleighs. The river was the only thoroughfare in those days.

A story is told of one of the Adams women who refused to have her child baptized by a clergyman of another faith. This particular clergyman made an annual trip

among the early settlers and would baptize their children if they so desired. Some parents were glad to accept his services, but not this lady (it may have been Sarah mentioned above). She took her child to Charlottetown to be baptized in the church of her fathers. It would be interesting to know if that baptism is recorded in the registers of St. Paul's Church, Charlottetown. As the first entries were made in 1779 it well might be. Keith Adams of Burlington is a direct descendant of these men. The home has always been in the possession of some members of the Adams family. The grandfather clock brought from England is in his home and is in good condition. Bruce Adams of New London is also a direct descendant.
