MONTREAL, Jan. 6 (CP)—Lanky Lorne Ferguson fired two goals Saturday night to lead Boston Bruins to a 3-2 defeat over Montreal Canadiens in a rousing battle before 14,478 fans.

Ferguson broke up the game with less than two minutes to go. His winning goal snapped a three-game losing streak for the sagging Bruins and ended a five-game winning spurge by Canadiens.

IN THIS CORNER

A drowning man will go down three times before he is lost and Saturday night the Moncton Hawks came close to going under for their third time. Twice before in the past three weeks the Hawks have come close to the folding post but they were probably never closer to it than they were Saturday night. Had they gone under they would have been lost for the rest of the season and probably for a number of years to come.

Since then things have brightened somewhat and last night there were indications that the Hawks would be sticking with the ship. Coach Johnny Horeck was of the opinion that the newly formed Moncton Community Hockey Association could finance matters successfully. They have a big task ahead of them when they must collect \$6,000 in order to pay the back salaries of players who have not been paid for two weeks. The players are supposed to be paid at noon today and if the newly formed Association can not live up to its expectations then the Hawks may cease to exist.

Following the game Saturday night the Moncton players were a disgusted group of young men although they have just beaten the Islanders 4-0. They had played the last game, they stated. They added that they had not been paid for two and a half weeks and they were going to disband immediately. Cracked one player "We may go to the Olympics, we're strictly amateur players now."

To collect the \$6,000 today the newly formed association will attempt to do in a day what R. Dwight Mitton and his organization could not do in two weeks. Mitton set his objective at \$10,000 and could raise only \$2,000. Shares were first offered at \$100 each and then reduced to \$10. Still the sale was not brisk.

Mitton's task was not made any easier by the refusal of LeBaron Reid, Hawks owner, to transfer the ownership of the club to the Citizenship committee. Reid promised to go through with the transfer but reportedly when it came time to sign over the club he refused. When the Moncton fans learned of Reid's refusal they balked at the idea of putting money into a fund that would go to pay off Reid's liabilities which reportedly amounted to \$12,000. Last week Mitton gave up his task of attempting to collect the necessary money. Saturday night it was reported that Reid would definitely give up ownership Sunday.

If Reid has given up ownership it should be possible for the newly formed association to raise the necessary money. The attendance at Saturday night's game indicated that the Moncton people want major league hockey. It was estimated that there were anywhere from 3200 to 3500 fans present although the official figures were somewhat over 2000. Of course one does not have to be an Al Capone to get into the Stadium for nothing.

The game itself was a ragged affair but it appeared to please the customers in the first and last periods. In the first session the Hawks scored three times and scored nicely executed plays. The Hawks demonstrated a neat pattern play while the Islanders were a man short and they scored on it during the first period. The Islanders controlled the play in the second period, and in the third session play roughened up to the delight of the fans. The crowd loudly booed Phil Vitale after Phil hit Marshall with a hard body check.

The Islanders played without the services of Willie Marshall and Don Bellinger who are in the hospital with the flu and will likely remain there for several days according to the hospital authorities. Moncton Hawks Score 4-0 Shutout Over Islanders Saturday Night

MONCTON, Jan. 7 (Special)—The Moncton Hawks, playing what many of the team members considered was their last game in a Moncton uniform, shutout the second place Charlottetown Islanders 4-0 in a dull Maritime Major Hockey League game here Saturday night.

The Hawks, unpaid for two and a half weeks, skated into a 3-0 lead in the first period by counting on three cleverly executed plays. They failed to get a shot on the Islanders net in the middle stanza but came back in the third period to score another goal.

Most of the action was kept until the last half of the final period when the Islanders attempted to break Lockhart's shutout. The game roughened up considerably and provided the 3200 fans in attendance with some thrills but the score board did not change.

Lockhart in the Moncton net was brilliant at times as he prevented the Islanders from scoring. He handled 23 shots, being particularly good in the last period on drives by Trainor, Favero and Pawlyshyn.

Standings Unchanged

The win left the league standings unchanged. The fourth place Hawks failed to gain ground on the third place Glace Bay Miners who defeated Halifax Saint Mary's. The Miners are only two points behind the Islanders.

A committee of ten Moncton business and professional men was set up at the meeting and will conduct a canvass on behalf of the team.

In the meantime, the new group has promised to raise more than \$6,000 tomorrow, to meet last week's payroll and another pay due the players tomorrow.

The committee comprises Cecil A. Peake, F. A. Ryder, R. D. Kell, A. G. English, F. M. Dayton, Frank Coyle, Dr. Les Albanach, Francis Breau, Edgar T. LeBlanc, and H. R. Brown.

The committee will endeavour to make the financing of the club a community effort. It was set up after R. Dwight Mitton informed club members Saturday that a drive he had headed failed to meet expectations and that he was abandoning the project.
