

Groups Seek To Purchase B. C. Lions Football Club

VANCOUVER (CP)—A vigorous campaign is being conducted by private groups here to buy the British Columbia Lions football club.

Lions, box office hits but a bust in the past since they entered the Western Interprovincial football Union in 1954, had one of their worst seasons in 1958.

The club, beset by coaching problems, player friction, injuries and sharp criticism from football writers, finished the 1958 season in last place. Lions lost a league-record 10-straight games before getting a victory.

construction engineering firm were handed Lions. Coley Hall, hockey and hotel operator here, said he would make a better offer if Lions members decided to sell.

All will be considered at the club's annual meeting Wednesday night, when the question of selling the team is to be put before the membership as an extraordinary resolution. This would require a two-thirds majority to carry. There is no proxy-voting permitted among the club's 3,000 members with votes.

The Ralston group offered \$100,000 for the club.

President Harry Spring said

the Bailey offer is "an insult to the intelligence of members. He's not even offering \$1 for the club. All he will do is guarantee to put up \$100,000 operating capital."

"Even the Ralston offer, if accepted would be a steal. The club is worth at least \$1,000,000."

There has been no comment on the situation from the other four W.F.U. members—Edmonton, Calgary, Saskatchewan and Winnipeg—who needed considerable coaxing originally before Vancouver was given a league franchise, and who would have to approve any transfer of the franchise to a new group of operators.

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SPORTS FRONT

AFTER ALL the wild goings-on of last Tuesday night in Summerside's Civic Stadium, you would expect that almost anything would happen in the next league game there. Well the Royals made the trip Friday night, got a really bad lacing but the affair was as mild as one could possibly see. Only four minor penalties were called by the referees.

We were not one bit surprised by the outcome of that battle because we couldn't figure how an undermanned team like the Royals could do anything with the well-conditioned Summerside team. We figured correctly as the westerners romped home in 11-2 fashion.

THE ROYALS have quality but their quantity is something that has to be attended to if they wish to compete with any degree of success in this loop. They had eight men to go to Summerside on Friday and upped that number to ten with the help of the Garrison Juniors. Donnie McCormack and Joey Arsenault went along and played for the Parkdale gang.

The Royals will have John Belevance their ace defenceman back from his Christmas holiday this week. Allie Carver hasn't appeared with the Royals these past few games and we just don't know when he'll be back. Brother Skippy played one game but wasn't been back since that one. But even if they all return, that only makes eleven and that's not enough to carry to successfully compete in a league such as this. Give the Royals a few injuries and a bit of sickness and they won't have enough to ice a team.

WHERE THEY ARE GOING to get reinforcements "we don't know. But one thing is certain and that is that these reinforcements must come or the Royals are going to be left out in the cold. We are not for a moment discounting the several fine players on that Royal lineup but we are confident they need relief in a real hurry."

Royals may figure that with their eleven men available, they can take care of themselves in this league. They are entitled to their opinion just as much as we are entitled to ours. If they can't find some additional strength, then we sincerely hope they prove us wrong. We'll be the first to admit that we were wrong.

Until then, however, we'll go along with our own ideas.

GOOD HOCKEY PLAYERS are not the type that are continually getting penalties. A player with ability doesn't need to resort to cheap practices in order to get through a hockey game. That doesn't mean that every player that gets a penalty lacks ability. Not at all. Every now and then, the best of players are guilty of some offences that earn them trips to the stinners' row. But those trips are the exception, not the rule.

However, when you find a player—and we use the word loosely—who continually persists in playing dirty hockey, then you have found a player who has very little natural ability. He is usually trying to make up for his lack of talent by indulging in practices that are against the rules of the game. Every league has such individuals and our own league is not exempt.

When referees run into grief with players, you can bet in the majority of cases the offenders are those who are short on talent. Now and then the talented player will blow his top and get properly rewarded for his bad taste. But these are isolated cases and don't spoil our argument one little bit.

IT TAKES ABILITY to score goals, set up others to put them in the net. You need hockey talent to properly backcheck, to handle yourself capably on defence. It's an art to be able to kill time when your team is shorthanded, to be able to make the right moves when your club is executing a power play.

In sharp contrast, however, it takes no ability to do the things that the rules say you shouldn't do. No brains are required to give someone a butt end of a stick. No special course is needed to blow off steam at an official, to hurl lip at people in attendance at hockey games. These things are not the product of any mental work. They are "sour grapes" from chaps that know they haven't what it takes to make hockey players.

Naturally there must be different degrees of hockey ability. But those who possess the lesser degrees shouldn't try to cover up their deficiencies with cheap practices.

How about it.

EACH MEMBER of Baltimore Colts received \$4,718.77 for winning the National Football League title. That wasn't a bad afternoon's work.

But the good fortune doesn't end there. There's smore gravy to be served and the Colts are the boys who are ready to lap it up.

A brewing company that sponsors Colts' games on radio and TV has made a gift of \$25,000 and another similar sum is reported from a fan who has enjoyed immensely what the Colts did this past season.

When the boys split up this windfall, there'll be more rejoicing.

And could you blame them.

WE LIKED THIS story that went the rounds after the Colts-Giants battle.

After the teams had finished regulation play with the score tied, the television announcer said, "Well, this is a game we'll never forget."

"Why did he say that?" a Milwaukee housewife asked.

"Because of the sudden death," the husband replied.

"Sudden death?" she said. "Who died?"

GINO CIMOLI is the only Los Angeles Dodger who'll be missing when the Dodgers start their spring training. Cimoli will go to spring training but he'll be with the St. Louis Cardinals.
