Findings In Heart Ailments Summarized By Specialist

MONTREAL (CP) — Dr. Claude Allard of Montreal said Monday some men who seem "highly masculine" show a high fat content in their bloodstreams and therefore are more vulnerable to heart diseases.

Dr. Allard, who works with the Institute of Cardiology (Institut de Cardiologie) at the University of Montreal, said he based his findings on tests administered to 1,000 French-Canadian men living in the city of Montreal.

He said the degree of masculinity was measured by the extent on the neck, arms and thighs of the men involved as well as the circumference of their arm and thighs.

His tests indicated that men showing high masculinity have a greater concentration of cholesterol and triglyceride than others.

At the age of 60 or greater, the cholesterol content was not different. Similarly, in the 50-50 group from throughout North and South America are attending five-day congress, which ends Thursday.

Dr. Allard, summarizing his findings, said: "It was observed that in the male an increase in weight of 10 pounds or more since the age of 25 appeared to influence the concentration of some serum lipid components."

Other research workers have related such high fat content with an increased incidence of heart disease.

He said there is a "protective mechanism in females preventing them from developing coronary artery disease."

This mechanism, Dr. Kirschhorn said, may also help to retain a lower fat-content level in women who were tested after a period of fasting.

Dartmouth Auto Firm Challenges Industry

DARTMOUTH, N.S. (CP) — Officers of Volvo Canada Limited here, who adapted an abandoned sugar refinery for the assembly of automobiles, have suggested other Maritime industries might sweeten their own profits by adopting production machinery for various uses.

Hans Larsson, president of Volvo Canada Limited and Volvo Incorporated in the United States, said it's possible industry in the Maritime could adapt their present equipment to make certain component parts for Volvo cars being assembled at the company's plant here.

At a press conference last week that marked the end of the first year's production in the Dartmouth plant, he challenged Maritime industry to make component parts not only for the assembly plant but for the "entire Swedish production line."

He said the Canadian government's automobile parts export incentive program is largely responsible for the competition offered to buy from Canadian manufacturers much more than is available for the Dartmouth operation.

William G. Odette, manager of the Dartmouth plant, said the wide range of parts already being made in Canada but only the small proportion came from Maritime industry.

Opening lead - ten of hearts.

You hear a lot about bridge tournaments and the champions who play in them, but the chances are that if you watch an expert play without knowing who he was, you would not be greatly impressed.

The fact is that the expert seldom makes a sensible bid or play, his chief stock in trade being that he rarely makes an error. In fact, his play is not one of precise reasoning far more than of any other factor, and it is his ability to see the end of the line that makes him a champion.

Take a hand like this one played in a national tournament. South was in four spades and when a heart was cashed the A-K and returned a heart, declarer winning with the ace, a club to the ace, and ruffed a club. Next came the club, declarer ruffed and made the balance of the tricks.
