

An Indian in the Courts.

A Halifax despatch says:—"Another interesting law suit has arisen out of the somewhat famous Salmon River gold mines. H. W. C. Boak has brought a suit in the Equity Court for Peter Paul, an Indian of East Quoddy, against Alexander Kent Archibald, Henry and Timothy Archibald. The declaration sets forth that Paul discovered rich gold bearing quartz and got some specimens, and A. K. Archibald induced him to show where he made the discovery by promising him \$20 and further undertaking to take up the areas and work the mine at his own expense and in his own name giving Paul half the proceeds. Archibald communicated with the other defendants, and Mott took up the claim and subsequently transferred his shares to A. C. Archibald and others. Twenty dollars were paid the plaintiff, and the other part of the agreement was broken. The Indian now claims the fulfillment of the agreement for half a share in the mine and half what has already been taken therefrom." This is one of the first, if not the first, suit ever brought for an Indian in Nova Scotia.
