Faubus' Victory Spells Trouble For Democrats

WASHINGTON (AP)—The landslide victory of Governor Orval Faubus in Arkansas spells trouble in 1960 for the divided Democratic party.

It also means stiffened political opposition to racial integration.

That is the view veteran national politicians are taking of the sweeping primary triumph Tuesday of the governor whose barring of Negro students last September from Little Rock Central High School was followed by President Eisenhower's dispatch of federal troops.

The avalanche of votes rolled up by Faubus in winning Democratic re-election—equal to re-election in this state—appear likely to bring rallying around the governor elements of the electorate who would not hesitate to break with the Democratic party in 1960, presidential election year if it takes its expected stand against segregation.

Faubus has said he intends to remain in the Democratic party. But most Southern politicians here think he will be subjected to a great deal of pressure to break away and lead a segregationist ticket in 1960.

These professionals, who shudder at the thought of another abortive third party movement, are not likely to flock to Faubus as their leader. Unless events change their minds he will not be the symbol for the fight they expect to make within the party to prevent the nomination of a non-integrationist as a presidential candidate.

That Faubus' victory was a setback for school integration was conceded by two foes of segregation.

Senator Jacob K. Javits (Rep. N.Y.) said he has no doubt the demonstration of sentiment registered in Arkansas indicates even stiffer opposition to integration in the future.

Senator Richard L. Neuberger (Dem. Ore.) said in a separate interview that Faubus' victory was "a disappointing thing and, unfortunately, it may set the pattern in the South."

Senator James O. Eastland (Dem. Miss.), a leading segregationist, said he thinks that the vote for Faubus represents widespread sentiment in the Southern states against integration.

New Plant Is Planned For Halifax Area

HALIFAX (CP)—Nova Scotia Industrial Estates Limited announced Wednesday that arrangements have been completed for construction of a new plant for Regent Aluminum Products (Maritime) Limited at nearby Woodside.

F. H. Sobey, president of Industrial Estates, said the company will build a 26,000-square foot plant. Regent would add curtain, wall and industrial windows to its present storm window manufacturing line, now operating in temporary quarters.

Regent employs about 50 persons now, but anticipates work for about 150 when the new plant is completed, Mr. Sobey said. The company with head office in Toronto, said it will install rolling equipment and facilities for aluminum finishing treatment.

Fall Meeting Of World Bank May Strengthen West

OTTAWA (CP)—A meeting in New Delhi this fall may produce the free world's reply to Communist economic penetration.

Canada's hope is that decisions will be taken to inject fresh capital resources into two major international organizations, the International Monetary Fund and the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development, also known as the World Bank.

The two bodies meet in October. Canada would like to see member countries increase subscriptions to the IMF by 50 per cent, providing an additional \$3,000,000,000 to increase the "liquidity" of international trade.

Similarly, it is suggested that guarantees to the World Bank should be increased from 80 to 160 per cent of capital subscriptions, boosting the bank's borrowing power to several billions of dollars.

The two suggestions were discussed Friday by Prime Minister Diefenbaker, who said Russian and Communist Chinese economic campaigns constitute a "tremendous danger" to free societies.

"Such action at this time," he said in a Commons speech, "would assure the less developed countries of the possibility of further assistance and would build a bulwark against the Communist advance in the uncommitted countries."

Economic experts, reading between the lines of Mr. Diefenbaker's statement, said much will depend on the United States, biggest contributor to both organizations. In recent months, the U.S. has shown increasing awareness of the Communist economic offensive.

Therefore, informants said, it may not be unduly optimistic to hope that the suggestion of infusing new resources into the IMF and the World Bank may recommend itself to the U.S. as one means of meeting the Sino-Russian challenge.

Recent developments, including the visit to Washington and Ottawa of British Prime Minister Macmillan, have caused the West to take another look at the economic instruments available for facilitating the free flow of international trade.

GREAT STRIDES MADE

In the decade since the IMF and World Bank were set up, tremendous economic development has taken place, the purchasing power of money has declined and the need for greater reserves to buttress the increased volume of trade has become sharply apparent.

After 10 years of post-war expansion, culminating in the present temporary pause, the time seems appropriate to consider a new approach, experts say.

The IMF, designed to help countries in balance-of-payments difficulties, now has resources totalling about \$2,750,000,000. More than half of this is already committed in standby credits.

Charge Israel, West In Plot

LONDON (Reuters)—The Soviet news agency Tass said Wednesday night there is an extensive plot between Israel and the West against the Middle East and that victims of Western aggression there would be helped by "the peace-loving peoples."

The statement, quoted by Moscow Radio, said Russia has facts that there is an extensive imperialist plot in which the U.S.A., Britain, the Baghdad Pact powers and Israel participate. From these facts the gravity of the danger to the Middle and Near East countries becomes evident.

It said there is no doubt that if "the free Israel people, who are defending their just cause, are subjected to aggression being prepared by the Baghdad Pact, the other peace-loving peoples will help the victim of the aggression."

The statement said the reason for Western evasion of a summit meeting is "evident in the light of the policy which now is being pursued by the West."

Want Amherst To Have Deaf School

FREDERICTON (CP)—Education Minister Taylor said Wednesday the New Brunswick government will make strong representations to the Nova Scotia government to have a new school for the deaf located in Amherst.

The school now is located in Halifax. A recent announcement said the Nova Scotia government is considering a number of sites including Truro and Amherst.

Mr. Taylor said since cost of the new school is being shared on the basis of the number of pupils from each province, it should be located as close to the New Brunswick border as possible for the convenience of New Brunswick parents.

Remove Ban On Sale Of Ships

LONDON (Reuters)—The government Wednesday announced the removal of restrictions on the sale of certain British ships abroad.

Transport Minister Watkinson said in future he will give a general sanction permitting, with certain exceptions, the free transfer of mortgage of ships to all countries abroad.

The exceptions are on the sale of certain categories of ships to countries in the Soviet bloc and Communist China, and also on the sale of former naval craft to any foreign country.

Watkinson said he also has decided to discontinue the procedure by which the sale of ships abroad for scrap was sniped only if the British Iron and Steel Corporation (Salvage) Limited was not prepared to match the foreign price.

MONTREAL (CP)—The Du Pont Company of Canada (1956) Limited Wednesday announced net income of \$2,339,000 for the first half of 1958, down from \$2,639,000 in the corresponding period last year.

Earnings equalled 31 cents a common share compared with 35 cents in the first six months of 1957.
