

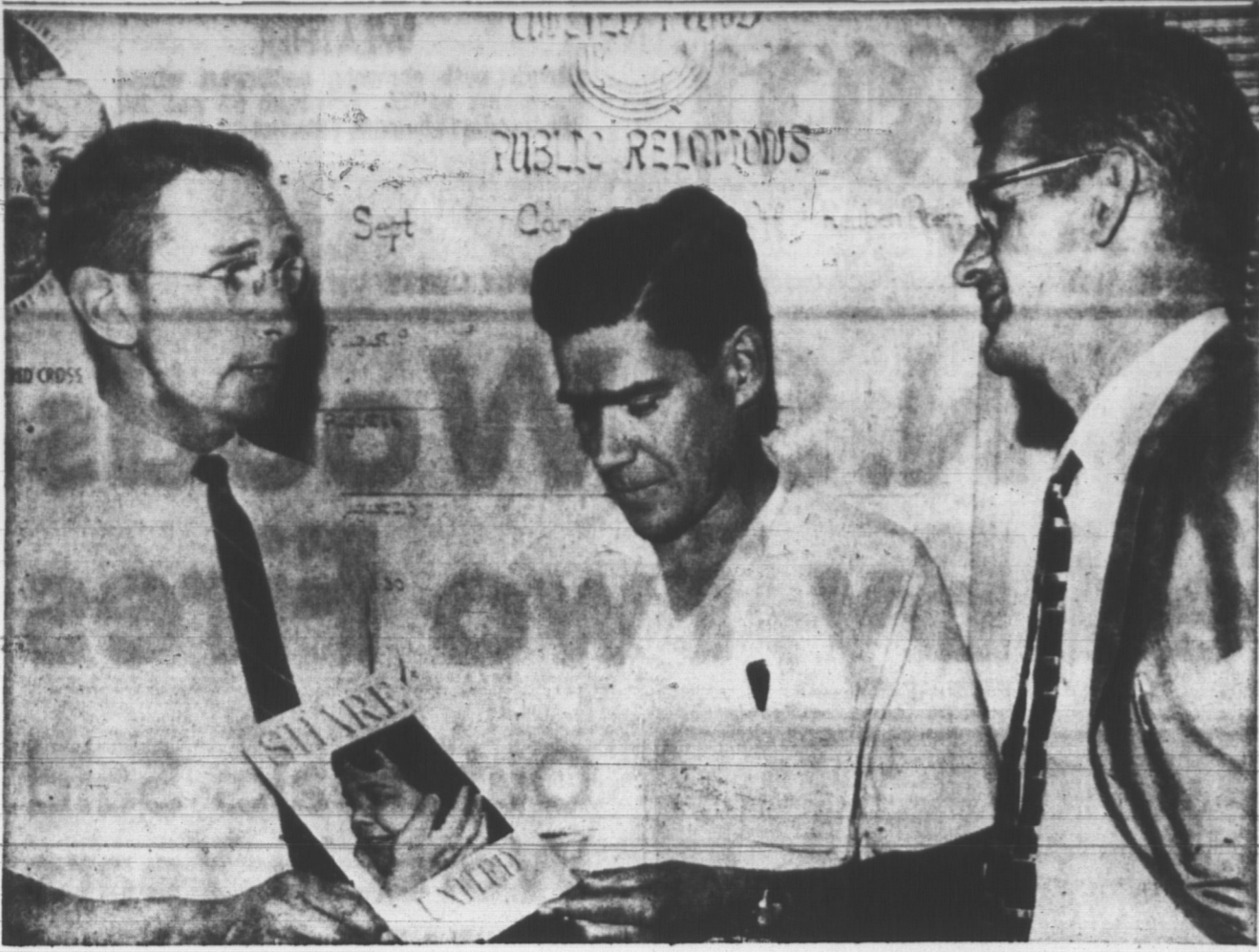
Two Arraigned In Club Break

Objective Announced For P.E.I. United Fund

An objective of \$281,876.00 for 1966 for the United Fund of Prince Edward Island was announced yesterday at a meeting of campaign leaders combined with members of the public relations committee held at the Red Cross Centre in Charlottetown.

In announcing the objective which is the total of the approved budget, President Alan Holman explained that the total includes an amount for youth work for a new agency, The Basilica Recreation Centre, of Charlottetown. The Recreation Centre had been faced with the alternative of an individual campaign or casting its lot with the United Fund and its application as a participating agency was approved by the board a short time ago.

The "kick-off" date for the general campaign has been set for September 20, but preliminary canvassing for "advance gifts" as well as the Payroll section will get underway early in September.

Under general chairman George Chandler, chairmen of the various committees are busy perfecting their organization and all are reported to be prepared to work hard and enthusiastically toward the attainment of the announced objective.

Individual allotments: The budgets submitted by the participating agencies have been carefully scrutinized by the budget committee under the chairmanship of Randolph W. Manning, C.A. The agencies and their allocations for 1966 are as follows: Multi-service agencies: Canadian Welfare Council, \$1,258; Canadian Red Cross Society - P.E.I. Division, \$35,400; Health agencies: Canadian National Institute for the Blind, \$13,834; Canadian Mental Health Association, \$11,580; Multiple Sclerosis Society of Canada - P.E.I. Chapter, \$6,900; Canadian Foundation for Poliomyelitis and Rehabilitation (March of Dimes) P.E.I. Chapter, \$4,225; Cerebral Palsy Association of P.E.I., \$3,133.

New Gypsum Mine Opened 35 Miles South Of Winnipeg

MORRIS, Man. (CP)—A new gypsum mine tapping a reserve estimated at 20,000,000 tons was officially opened Monday by Premier Duff Roblin near this town 35 miles south of Winnipeg. Developed by Western Gypsum Products Ltd., the new \$500,000 operation replaces the firm's 35-year-old Amaranth mine in Northern Manitoba as its principle supply of gypsum in the province.

Since production started late last fall, a 14-man crew have been producing 500 tons of the mineral and President Nigel W. Puttock says the total this year should exceed 200,000 tons.

He says only one shaft has been sunk but more could readily be made available should demands for gypsum—used for plasterboard, Portland cement and other construction materials—continue to rise.

It could supply the Prairies' need for the material "for several years."

Russia Is Foreseen Big Buyer Of Wheat

By JOHN BEST MOSCOW (CP)—Russia again will be a big buyer of wheat from Canada and other foreign countries during the coming crop year, Western trade experts predicted Monday.

Purchases should run into the hundreds of millions of dollars, they said. The forecast is based on indications that Russia's own wheat crop will be a disappointing one.

The winter wheat crop, harvesting of which now is coming to a close, is said to be good. Some recent travellers to the Ukraine, principal producer of winter wheat, got the impression that it will be the best or nearly the best on record.

However, all signs point to a relatively small harvest of spring wheat, gathering of which gets under way in earnest about two weeks from now.

Officially, there has been little to indicate the size of the crop. But widespread reports tell of drought or near-drought conditions afflicting Kazakhstan and neighboring areas of the Russian federation, east of the Volga River, vital areas for the spring wheat harvest.

The dry weather is reported to have lasted at least through June, regarded as the crucial month for wheat growth. Experts are estimating that the over-all wheat crop may dip to 65,000,000 tons or lower from last year's reported 74,000,000 tons.

Last crop year, though its own harvest was relatively good, Russia bought something like \$300,000,000 worth of wheat in the world market. Western analysts would not be surprised if it bought at least that much again.

Islander Tops 600-Yd. Shoot Capt. Roy McCabe of Charlottetown captured top honors Friday night to become the first islander to win the President's match fire from 600 yards at the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association's annual meet at the Connaught ranges west of Ottawa.

Earlier in the week Capt. McCabe captured top honors in the NDHQ service aggregate. In the shootoff Capt. McCabe registered a possible 25 points, while his two opponents, Pte. John Thompson of New Glasgow, N.S. and E.S.W. Andrews of the British Royal Marines each finished with 24.

GETS LONDON POST OTTAWA (CP)—L. H. Ausman, 57, a 31-year veteran in the trade department, has been appointed commercial minister for the department in London, it was announced Thursday. Mr. Ausman, who has served as commercial councillor in Brussels for the last seven years, succeeds B. C. Butler who has been named Canadian high commissioner to Malaysia.

Aluminum Ltd. Business Up MONTREAL (CP)—Consolidated sales and revenues of Aluminum Ltd. for the first six months of 1965 were \$420,000,000 compared with \$366,000,000 a year earlier, the company said Monday.

Net income, before preferred dividends was \$27,100,000 against \$26,200,000. Profits available for common shares were 83 cents per share compared with 80 cents for the corresponding period last year.

Accounts for Aluminum Company of Canada Ltd. were consolidated with those of the parent firm, Alcan said.

Small Blaze Extinguished SUMMERSIDE — The Summerside Fire Department extinguished a minor fire at the Montgomery warehouse about 1:30 Monday morning.

The building, located at the corner of First and St. Stephen streets, was completely gutted by fire two years ago but since then has been completely rebuilt and continues to be used as a warehouse.

Cold Storage Plant Up For Sale The provincial department of public works has called tenders for the purchase of the government cold storage plant on Esher Street in Charlottetown.

The government last spring decided to close the building as it was felt, as one cabinet minister pointed out, "public cold storage was not an activity that can best be provided by government."

It is understood, however, that sale of the cold storage facilities does not mean that the building will be closed. The government plans to operate the building until Dec. 1 and if the building is sold by tender, there is said to be provision that the purchaser must continue to provide public cold storage facilities.
