

Problems At Georgetown Are Discussed By Premier

The Gulf Garden Foods Limited and Bathurst Marine Limited were constructed with tax payers' money by the Conservative government...

Discussions with Norwegian interests in Gulf Garden Foods Limited failed to develop. "Norinvest asked that the government continue to operate the plant until they further their studies at Bathurst Marine which would be months from now."

Over a million dollars is needed before Gulf Garden Foods Limited is able to operate. "We have to find \$1,500,000 to clear up present bills before the company can be put back into operation," said Premier Campbell.

Consideration will be given to payment of back wages owing Gulf Garden Foods Limited workers at today's cabinet meeting in Charlottetown. There are approximately 250 men out of work as a result of the closure of the fish processing plant.

"We as a government have had several meetings with Mr. Moe—no one is denying there are financial difficulties—we also held meetings with representatives of Norinvest whose money has passed through these companies," said Premier Campbell.

Mid-East Crisis On Oil Deepens

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Syria followed the cutoff of the Iraq Petroleum Co. pipeline to its port of Banias by turning off the one to Lebanon Tuesday, drying up an important source of West European oil. Thus the crisis between the company and Syria deepened.

There was no immediate reply from Damascus to the company offer, but Syria announced last week it would be willing to submit the issue to arbitration.

Syria, which produces no oil itself, seized the company's assets inside its borders last week to support its demands for \$11,000,000 in increased transit royalties for the first nine months of 1966. The company refused to pay, saying the claim was exorbitant.
