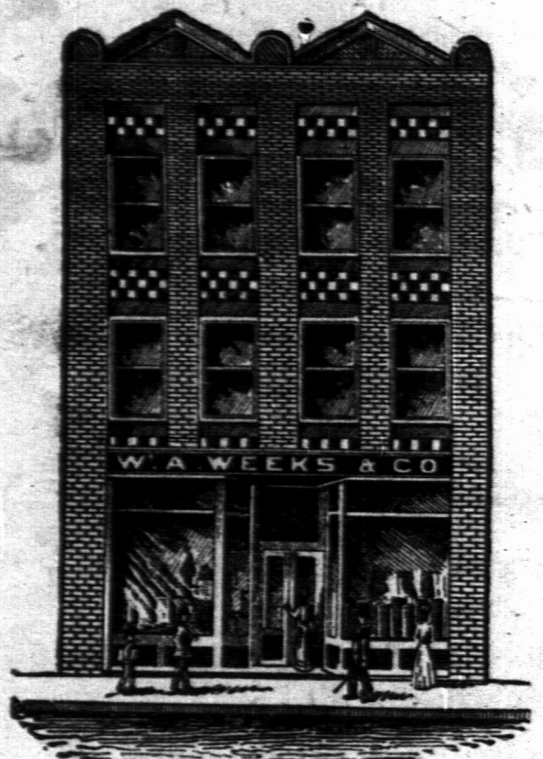

The Britannia's Excursion

A CORRESPONDENT GRUMBLES ABOUT A THING OR TWO.

To Editor Guardian.

SIR,—In your issue of this morning I observe a flattering notice of a short excursion trip made in the new Boston line steamer Britannia yesterday, to which I take exception.

About noon yesterday I happened to meet an influential American on the street, who asked me if I would like to go out with my wife on a short excursion trip in the steamer, to leave at 12.30, to be back 45t later than 4 p.m. I said yes. I was sure my wife would be delighted to go to get out of the sultry weather. I hurried home, and down we went. There was nothing said about giving us refreshments—I assumed that as a matter of course,—but, nevertheless, being an "old salt," and as we had a lad with us who was spending the day at my house, I thrust part of a cold fowl and some bread into my overcoat pocket, to provide against contingencies; and, as the sequel proved, it was a wise precaution.

The boat left the wharf at 12.45. There were not as many people on board for an occasion of this kind as I expected—probably 150—half of whom were children.

It was just a superb day. We had no sooner left the wharf than a cool delightful breeze from the north wafted away the hot air of the town. When we got out in the offing we met with a south-west breeze, and returning in the afternoon it changed again to a brisk breeze from the northwest. About half-past 1 we heard a bell ring. I said to my wife, "I suppose that bell means refreshments; had we not better go down?" She said, "Not without an invitation, and we are to be back at 4 o'clock." About half an hour later, beginning to feel somewhat peckish, I thought I would go down and see if there was anything to eat. I was told that everything had been eaten up. The steward, it seems, had not provided for so many people. There had been no arrangements made. The boys and girls and the officers' friends had swarmed in at the ringing of the bell, and eaten everything. There was nothing left for the "old folks" unlike "old Uncle Ned"

Who had no teeth to eat the hoe cake, so he had to let the hoe cake be.

We had good teeth, but the hoe cake was lacking.

It was my intention and that of several others who were on board, to have called upon Cardinal Gibbons at his levee between 4 and 6 p.m. in the afternoon, at the Bishop's palace, and I take the opportunity of showing that we were prevented from doing so. The Britannia ran over almost within sight of Brule harbor on the Nova Scotia side, and when 4 o'clock came, we were two hours sail from Charlottetown. We reached the wharf at half-past 6 and the partially hungry crowd were delayed, as it took the steamer half an hour to get along side the wharf. It was to my mind a shabby affair; but then we had enjoyed the glorious day in the offing and perhaps it is mean of us to look a gift horse in the mouth.

I cannot say too much in praise of this magnificent steamer. I wandered through her spacious saloons and suites of a partments and I came to the conclusion that her second class accommodation was equal to the Allan Line steamers first-class.

She was kept under easy steam returning and I noticed the ancient charmer St. Lawrence 5 miles behind us as we passed Point Prim when returning, and she was not left behind, but I fancied rather gained upon us; be that as it may, Captain Cameron knew how to lay his steamer along side the wharf in better style than did the officers of the Britannia, as they landed before we did.

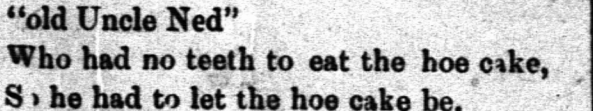
Married.

NOT A MOMENT'S WARNING.

Sudden Death of Mr. George Dockendorff.

A very sudden death occurred at Mr. T. J. Morris' store, about 11 o'clock Friday morning. Mr. George Dockendorff, farmer and stockbreeder, of North River, drove to the city. He called at W. F. Carter's confectionery store to leave some cream, and then went into Mr. Morris' store. Mr. Morris and Mr. Dockendorff had the following conversation:—

Mr. Morris—"Well, how is the world using you?"

Mr. Dockendorff—"Very well, although my health is not very good."

Mr. Morris—"What's the trouble?"

Mr. Dockendorff—"I have a bad pain in my side. I have been suffering with it for three months or more."

After advising Mr. Dockendorff to procure the best medical advice Mr. Morris left the store for a minute or two, and just as he returned he noticed Mr. Dockendorff fall to the floor. Mr. Morris lifted him and saw he was dying and called in the Marshal. Dr. Kelly was summoned—but too late to restore life. The body was conveyed to the Marshal's office. Dr. Conroy was sent for, but did not deem an inquest necessary. Heart disease was the cause of death. The body was taken to North River, Friday afternoon.

Mr. Dockendorff was the owner of the celebrated "Black Pilot."

The deceased was 48 years of age.
