

Whitlock Scores Overtime Goal To Give Islanders 4-3 Win Over Atlantics

HALIFAX, (CP)—Buck Whitlock scored at 1:06 of an overtime period to give Charlottetown Islanders a 4-3 win over Halifax Atlantics in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here Wednesday night.

Islanders pulled goalie Roger Bessette when Atlantics led 3-2 late in the third period. Gus Gustavson tied the score with less than a minute to go.

Charlottetown lost defenseman Don McLaughlin after he received a severe gash on the back of the head in a clash with Halifax's Johnny Morrow in the second period. McLaughlin charged Morrow, spinning him into the boards. Morrow, off balance, brought his stick around and clipped McLaughlin on the head. Morrow was given a major penalty for high sticking and McLaughlin a minor for holding.

Bob Gray, Gay Gignac, Gustavson, and Buck Whitlock scored for Islanders. Bill Ford, Morrow and Pete Wywrot were the Halifax goalkeepers.

The first period was scoreless, but Halifax led 2-1 by the end of the second. Charlottetown outscored Atlantics 2-1 to tie the game up in the third and send it into overtime.

Bessette stopped 29 threats for Islanders; Roy McMeekin stopped 35. Nine of the penalties handed out by Referee Laurie Power went to Halifax.

Sees 4-Minute Mile Possible

TORONTO, (CP)—The running of a four-minute mile is possible with the proper training and conditioning of the human body, Dr. Phil Edwards, head medical officer of the department of veterans' affairs hospital at St. Hyacinthe, Quebec, said Wednesday.

Dr. Edwards, one of Canada's top runners in the 1920s and '30s, said that taken in terms of basic psychology and biochemistry, the four-minute mile "appears impossible for a human being if we are to accept present medical theories."

"But with adequate training and economy of muscular action to produce the maximum mechanical efficiency coupled with circulatory and respiratory adjustments, I believe it is possible. The medical theories don't take in the human element."

GLACE BAY, N. S. (CP)—Glace Bay Miners swept through Sydney Millionaires Wednesday for four goals in the third period to record a 5-2 victory in a Maritime Major Hockey League game here.

Tommy Fyles of Glace Bay had his arm broken in the second period and was taken to St. Theresa's Hospital here. The last six minutes of the second period were played at the start of the third.

The win left Miners a point ahead of Charlottetown Islanders who defeated Halifax Atlantics 4-3. Glace Bay now trails second place Millionaires by seven points.

CHICAGO, (AP)—Former heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles exploded a second-round knockout over Chicago's Bob Satterfield Wednesday night to solidify his claim for a June bout with champion Rocky Marciano.

Charles lashed out with a ponderous left to send Satterfield flat on his back in 1:00 of the second round of a scheduled 10-rounder at the Chicago Stadium.

The 32-year-old Charles, 188, was a 7-2 favorite to dispose of Satterfield, 180, and the Cincinnati Negro went at his task with vicious vigor at the start of the second round.
