NEWS NOTES.

The Spanish Government has sent a committee to visit the United States, with a view to increasing the export of Spanish wines to that country.

Twenty persons have been killed by soldiers in Korea, Russia. They were Roman Catholics and lost their lives in the church at Kroschke, which had been ordered closed by the Czar's mandate.

Senator Voorhees thinks that after a reasonable time for debate the senators will not try to obstruct the tariff bill.

The Odessa correspondent of the London Times has learned that the Russian government has ordered another installment of the Trafalgar type. The ironclad is to be built at Nicolaï and to be named the Paris.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says that the recent annual conscription added 22,292 men to the army. Of this number 79,948 are married. Only one-fourth of the whole number of conscripts can read or write.

English men of letters and men of affairs have done themselves credit by the splendid tributes they have paid to the memory of James Russell Lowell. The Lowell memorial in Westminster Abbey consists of two stained glass windows. One of them is divided by two medallions into three parts, while at the bottom of the other two is a medallion portrait of the minister, author and poet. On the three sides of the medallion window are representations of an angel bearing a shield below the arms of the United States, the landing of the Pilgrim Fathers from the Mayflower, and the figure of St. Dorothy. On the other window are the arms of Sir Laurence, an angel bearing a shield below the arms of the United Kingdom, and a figure of St. Ambrose, as well as a symbolic representation of the laws.

OTAWA, Dec. 1.—An important change in the direction of mitigating somewhat the arbitrary rule in connection with the Royal Military College is announced. Hitherto it has been mandatory for a student to retire from the college in the event of failure at the end of any college term to qualify under the regulations. Henceforth it is proposed, on failure at the end of the first term, that he shall forfeit his claim to consideration for a session in the regulars, but his removal will not be compulsory. It may be permitted to continue his studies at the college after a first failure, but will retire after the second failure.
