

Greenville Man In Hospital Following Hit-Run Accident

SOURIS — Joseph MacDonald, 55, of Greenville, was taken to the Souris Hospital last evening as a result of a reportedly hit-and-run accident which occurred near Souris yesterday afternoon. Mr. MacDonald is suffering from cuts about the head and face, and also bruises and lacerations on the left hip and leg. His condition is reported as not to be too serious.

The accident occurred when Mr. MacDonald was walking on the roadway leading East out of

Souris. A car, meeting a truck loaded with potatoes, is said to have struck Mr. MacDonald, throwing him into the ditch. His plight was reported to Mrs. Richard Power, who took the injured man in her car to the office of Dr. A.A. MacDonald in Souris. A second examination of the injured man was made by Dr. MacDonald at the home of Mrs. Howard Longphigh, Jr., and he was removed to the Souris Hospital.

It is understood that the R.C.M.P. from Souris apprehended a suspect at Morell.

Six Escape As Car Leaves Road

Six residents of Kelly's Cross escaped serious injury early Wednesday morning when the car in which they were riding left the Trans Canada Highway near Bonshaw.

The driver of the vehicle told police he had been forced off the road by an oncoming vehicle which failed to dim its lights.

The car left the highway crossed a ditch and came to rest against a steep bank.

The driver and five passengers were shaken up but not seriously hurt. The car suffered considerable damage.

made that some entombed men were still alive. But it appeared mine officials testing for gas were the first to find out.

Earl Wood, one of the bare-faced rescue workers on the job when contact was made with the 12, said he heard the words holed through the broken air line.

One mine official also said he thought he heard muffled voices yelling "come and get us" from behind the solid wall of rock ahead.

The rescue crews redoubled their efforts as soon as contact was established.

"GOOD SHAPE"

Wood said those behind the barrier were in "good shape" except Joseph McDonald whose leg was broken.

Report of the miraculous survival came at a time when few in this tragedy ridden town held any real hope for those entombed.

Canadian Mineral Output Seen Tripled in 25 Years

Canada's vast underground mineral warehouse is ready to burst into an explosion of growth which experts feel may triple the nation's mineral output in the next 25 years.

The major emphasis on exploration of recent years has uncovered new deposits of iron, lead, zinc, copper, lithium, columbium, tantalum, manganese, uranium and thorium.

At the moment Canada leads the world in the production of asbestos and nickel; is second in aluminum, platinum, lead and zinc; third in coal and silver; and fourth in iron ore. The day is not far distant when Canada will lead the world in uranium production and jump to second place in the world production of iron ore.

It is estimated that by 1983 Canada's mineral industry will account for 33 per cent of the nation's exports.

In Manitoba, Wintaring Lake and Herb Lake are centres of attraction. International Nickel and Rio Canadian, Hudson Bay Mining, Sherritt Gordon, Parminco, and many other companies have been making interesting finds since Inco decided to go ahead with its Moak-Thompson project. Major is Gulf Sulphur operation are in progress.

In the Matagami area of Quebec attracted wide interest. It could prove to be one of Canada's major mineral discoveries.

And there are other areas in Canada which are being checked. Extensive air geophysics is being conducted in Manitoba, Nova Scotia and Ontario.

Lake Mines—has underway a major exploration and development program. The original companies in the syndicate included Noranda Mines, Teck-Hughes, New Dickenson, Crosspat and Consolidate Goldfields.

These syndicate operations have been typical of exploration in the past year. Mining companies have been forced to carry out extensive surveys to indicate initial areas of promise (anomalies) which are then followed up and checked by ground work.

In the Lac La Ronge area a minor staking rush followed aerial survey by the government.

Further exploration is being carried out in the Yukon and Northwest Territories.
