LAST YEAR'S ACCOUNTS

Show a Deficit of \$36,915 03—Public Debt About \$550,000 00.

The report of the Provincial Auditor, submitted yesterday afternoon, shows the following receipts and expenditures:

Total expenditures.....\$302,503.34
Receipts, less proceeds of debentures sold..... 265,588.31

Deficit for 1899.....\$36,915.03

Debentures to the sum of \$17,089.50 were sold during the year, and in the auditor's report are added to the receipts.

The Government claim that of the total expenditures, \$25,714.49 are chargeable to capital, as follows:
Permanent bridges.....\$ 6,848.63
Public buildings..... 17,120.11
Rights of Way..... 1,495.70
Mount Stewart abatement..... 250.00

The Provincial debt account shows:
Balance against the province \$136,756.77
Debentures account..... 203,467.20
Loans account..... 160,464.89

Debt of the province as shown \$500,688.86

In addition to this, there was due at the end of the year, on account of "uncompleted contracts," \$42,509.29—not to speak of all the outstanding debts unpaid at that date.

It is clear that the Provincial liabilities amount to upwards of \$550,000.00. The following are the details of ordinary revenue and ordinary expenditure:

A CAPITAL ACCOUNT.

When the Liberals were in opposition they had no thought of "a capital account." Then an expenditure upon the erection or repair of a building or a bridge was just an ordinary expenditure, and was classed as such.

But ever since they crossed to the Government benches on the strength of their promise to make revenue and expenditure meet, they have had "a capital account," a curious lapsed sort of a capital account,—which does not show the yearly appreciation or depreciation of "capital" or the amount of "capital" actually in possession, but simply the cash expenditures on certain works of a more or less permanent character.

These are a few of the little amounts, selected at random from the Public Works Report, which go to make up the sum of \$25,714.49—charged to capital account, and credited—nowhere!

This has been done to create a false impression in the minds of the people that the gentlemen now in office are, in some way, doing somewhat better than their predecessors who kept no capital account, and to make their deficit seem less than it really is.

It is remarkable that this lame and ridiculous "capital account" has been created at a time when the leading newspapers of Canada are protesting against the practice of the Dominion Government, under which a surplus or debt is shown apart from the expenditures upon permanent works—under which we congratulate ourselves on a yearly surplus and all the while the country is becoming more and more heavily encumbered by debt!

SHELLING SIR CHARLES.

The Patriot takes comfort in the idea that "the Montreal Star is reading Sir Charles Tupper some pretty severe lessons lately. This remarkable course on the part of the Star which a short time since out Herodotus in its laudation of the "Old Warhorse" is creating much surprise and consternation among the faithful." We quote the following from the "Star to hand this morning, headed "Shelling Sir Charles:

"The war upon "Tupper" proceeds merrily. The two terrible charges against him which we are hearing the most of these days, are that he is disloyal and that he and Kruger, traced far enough back, have a common ancestor. The first charge rests upon the notion—spread by insidious rather than plain statement—that he made an attack in Quebec city before a French-Canadian audience upon Imperial Federation; while the second fearful accusation had its birth in Sir Richard Cartwright's joke foundry.

"The use of these two "stuffed clubs" against the veteran statesman who leads the Opposition suggests a fearful poverty of material in the Liberal arsenal. When a party is reduced to a limping absurdity—such as the idea that Sir Charles Tupper, of all men, is disloyal—and a clumsily constructed specimen of after-dinner wit, for charges to bring against a political leader who dates farther back than Confederation, the public are driven to the inference

that his enemies really have not much to say.

"But these two appalling charges, unheeded shells flung out by smokeless powder, reveal the positions of the artilleryists who fired them. The Liberal party would dearly like to attach a tag of disloyalty to the name of Sir Charles Tupper. They know by bitter experience how deadly an appendage it is, and they have not forgotten who it was that charged them with "veiled treason" in 1891.

"Sir Charles is disloyal," "Sir Charles is anti-British" make either of these cries stick, and Sir Charles' career as Conservative leader would be over in this country.

"But Sir Charles is out of range from all such guns. The absurdity of picking upon him as a man to accuse of hostility to British interests, would be a sufficient protection without any other. Why then is the accusation made? This is a revealing question. Why does an escaping pickpocket often cry "stop thief" after some one else? It was just the other day that the people of Canada was furious with this Liberal Government because it hesitated to send troops to the help of Britain in South Africa, when all the other colonies were hastening to her aid and all the world was watching with critical eyes to see how much assistance the British Government could get from its boasted self-governing colonies. Then the people of Canada, with good reason, doubted the Imperial loyalty of the Government and its care for British interests. And the Ministers felt the sting of the accusation."
