Delinquent Taxpayers Facing Collection By Garnishee Plan

GEORGETOWN — The Georgetown Council met on Monday night, with Mayor Howard S. MacLennan presiding and a full slate of councillors in attendance.

The clerk read the minutes of the last regular meeting and two special meetings. Reports were received from the various committees.

The police report gave a detailed account of the day by day functions of the police officer for the month of November and showed the amount of \$250, as being collected in fines for the month.

The street committee reported that gravel had been placed in a number of low places on several streets; that two old wells, one on Gordon Street and one on George Street had been filled with sand, thus eliminating any danger to children, as the old wells due to the deterioration of the wooden tops were a danger.

Men have been employed for some time cutting the bushes and trees on a number of streets, under the winter works program.

It was reported that about one half of the valves, are now installed on the Atlantic Development Water line. These valves are being installed by the town for future use, when the town proceeds with the installation of a municipal water system.

A gate and posts for the gate to be placed at the town dump have been ordered and fencing will be procured. The dump, as always, continues to present a problem. Considerable money has been spent from time to time in keeping the dump in

shape but indiscriminate dumping by citizens continues. If this practice continues the council may be forced to place a man on duty at the dump site and charge for the privilege of dumping.

ACCOUNTS AUDIT
The balance of the town's per capita grant has now been received and an audit of the town's accounts will shortly take place in preparation to issuing the town's financial statement in January. In this connection, Arthur Garrett has been appointed as town auditor.

Bills amounting to \$1410.20 were certified as paid and bills amounting to \$490.43 were approved for payment.

A building permit was approved for the erection of the new unit senior housing building, now under construction on Kent Street. Building permits were also approved for Raymond Lavender to construct a self service grocery on the corner of Victoria and Grafton Streets, measuring 30 feet by 60 feet. The council also approved the application of Mrs. Raymond Solomon for the building of two houses in the Georgetown Royal area, which also comes under town planning regulations.

It was decided that the town hall would be made available, free of charge to the Georgetown school for their annual Christmas entertainment.

A cheque in the amount of \$300 was received under the physical fitness grant. This will be administered by Councillor Jackson, who will have Eric Wood assisting him and a separate account in the bank will be opened for this particular purpose, with the signing officers being the

town clerk and Councillor Johnson.

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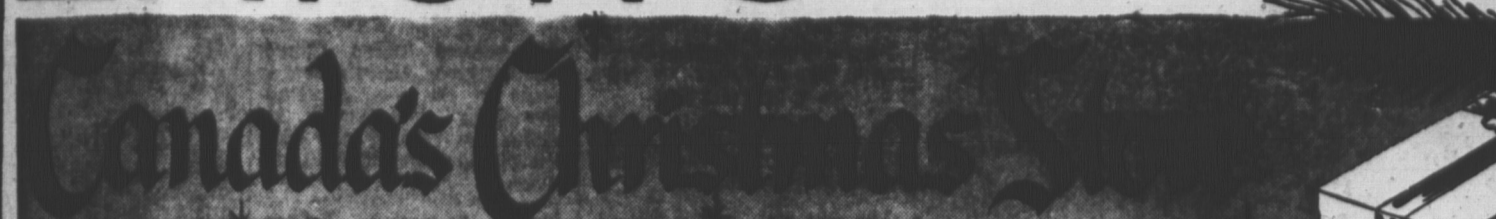
