AN EXPLANATION NEEDED.

Those who are interested in the course of the Guardian as to temperance legislation are not unnaturally astonished at its conduct within the past week. The question of Provincial Prohibition has been debated in Parliament. Reports of the debate accompanied by editorial remarks have appeared in the leading newspapers. But scarcely a word upon the question has been published in the temperance Guardian of Prince Edward Island. Even the strong letter of the President of the Provincial Alliance, Mr. John Anderson, of Kensington,—to which its attention was particularly directed,—failed to draw from it more than a few inane sentences to the effect that there may be differences of opinion between honest temperance men. The pertinent questions of THE EXAMINER and its correspondent "True Temperance" have been studiously avoided. It is desirable that a Provincial Prohibitory law should be passed by our Legislature and that the Canada Temperance Act should be voted out to allow it to go into operation, surely this is the time—just before the meeting of the Legislature—to impress the public with that fact. But the Guardian sedulously devotes itself to the great work of showing what it knows about the war in South Africa, the late Duke of Argyll, etc. Provincial Prohibition, about which all Canada has been talking throughout the past weeks, about which it has professed the warmest interest, has found no large space in the columns of the Guardian. Not even the noteworthy fact that the Leader of the House of Commons—Sir Wilfrid Laurier—has relegated the adjourned debate on Prohibition to the forty-third (!) position on the order paper has drawn from the Guardian a word of protest. What are we to infer? The Montreal Star—when commenting upon the discussion in Parliament, declared that "a tone of flagrant insincerity pervaded the whole debate"; that "the whole thing was a farce got up to humbug the temperance voters, and the moral is that until the temperance organizations take their case seriously they cannot expect the party politicians to do so." Are we to conclude that the Guardian has suddenly discovered that there was no fun in the farce? and that the proper course for temperance voters to pursue is, first of all, to demonstrate their sincerity by "voting down" the "deceivers" and "traitors"—we use Mr. Duncan Marshall's words—who nullified the plebiscite and gave Charlottetown a license law? We should be glad of an explanation on the part of the Guardian.

HEAVY EXPENDITURES

The war with Spain, and incidental expenditures, entailed a very heavy burden of cost upon the people of the United States. In the past two years and nine months the payment of the United States Government aggregated the enormous total of \$1,416,765,277.34. Of this great sum \$593,285,101.64 have gone for the army and navy, \$320,000,000 for the Philippine indemnity, \$393,766,227.35 for pensions, and \$108,906,835.66 for interest, an aggregate outlay of \$1,115,957,264.65 for old and new wars in the short space of two years and nine months. The money to meet the demands of the United States Government has in the meantime been obtained by the imposition of \$1,276,445,547.98 as taxation; \$72,000,169.63 was received from payments on account of debts due by the Pacific railroads, and the balance, \$68,307,559.73, formed part of the proceeds of the \$200,000,000 war loan.

DEATH OF MR. ROBERT DEWAR.

We announce with deep regret the death of Mr. Robert Dewar, which occurred at New Perth this morning. Mr. Dewar has been in failing health for some time, and his death was not unexpected. He leaves six children,—one a nurse at Brockton, Mass., two daughters and a son on the homestead, Mrs. E. S. Norton, of Brudenell, and Dr. Dewar, of Southport. He was married to Jessie, daughter of the late John Dewar, of Lot 48, and her sudden and untimely death in May last proved a great shock to him. Mr. Dewar was born about 71 years ago at New Perth, and in his death that settlement loses one of its oldest and most respected residents. The funeral will be held at 2 p.m., on Monday, to Brudenell Cemetery.
