THE PATENT PETTICOAT LIFTER.

The other end terminate in loops, which are led into the side of the skirt. As the lady wishes to go up stairs, she pulls loop No. 1 in the right pocket, and instantly the dress rises in front, so there the ascent is made with perfect ease. No. 2 in the left-hand pocket elevates the rest in the same manner, and all pulled at once lifts all the skirts knee high! This maneuver is intended for very muddy crossings.
