## Merchants, Citizens Are Urged To Decorate

Appointed to promote the placings of decorations for the Royal Visit of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip by the province, the city of Charlottetown, business houses and all citizens on the route of the Royal couple or in the vicinity of the route and generally dress up the area of visit in honour of this great occasion.

Ken R. MacDonald, chairman of the committee stated that "this Royal visit is an honour for the city and province and the committee feels that the citizens can return the compliment by showing by their decorations a warm welcome to our Queen as well as a civic pride in giving the city and area a colourful and festive air."

Meetings have been held to co-ordinate and plan the decorating to be done by the province and the city and letters have gone out to business houses and citizens both on and off the route suggesting that they plan and

order decorations as soon as possible to ensure delivery by the required time. Newspaper announcements have also been made for the same purpose. Orders to local merchants should be made by May 25th at the latest.

"Our present objective is to get the public to start thinking about the Royal Visit now and planning their decorating", said Mr. MacDonald.

"We are not interested in having anyone-business firm, citizen, city or province-going to unreasonable expense, but rather have each one do what their budget will stand on a moderate scale. Most important have each one get behind the effort and do something to decorate their property. Some business houses and the city will want to leave decorations up for the balance of the tourist season and these will add a colourful touch to the city."

"The committee is interested in having the citizens get behind the effort and showing with pride and loyalty that while Charlottetown may be close to last on the list of cities visited by the Royal couple it will be among the first in warmth of welcome. We urge all to get busy on plans now."

## School Director Conducts Course

Miss Jean Church, R.N., M.A., assistant director of Dalhousie University School of Nursing is conducting a five-day institute for head nurses and supervisors in Charlottetown this week. The classes are held alternately at the Charlottetown Hospital and the Prince Edward Island Hospital.

Nurses from all parts of the Island are in attendance, approximately 40 nurses are attending all sessions, while others attend intermittent sessions.

Miss Church is an excellent speaker and discussion leader and has employed discussion periods to assist the nurses in solving the problems which they meet in the day to day care of patients, in the teaching of students and in the administration of a hospital clinical unit.

This free discussion has been a salient feature of the institute and has served to promote enthusiasm and to provide a medium for gaining more insight into the close relationship between good nursing care and patients and careful ward administration. The head nurse is the key figure in hospitals. Actually the type of care which the patient receives revolves around her ability to manage the ward and teach students of nursing.

## Orphanage Group Given Choral Reading Honors

The highest mark received in both morning and afternoon sessions of the Musical Festival competitions held at two different auditoriums yesterday was awarded to St. Vincent's Orphanage.

The orphanage group performed at Prince of Wales College in the afternoon and were awarded a mark of 90 for their choral reading renditions of "Higglety, Pigglety, Pop" and "Hippety Hop to Bed" and "A Child's Grace."

Other placings in the Rural School Primary class were Fort Augustus School, who placed second with a mark of 85 and Grand Tracadie School with a mark of 82 taking third place.

A total of 18 classes were adjudicated at the two auditoriums. Competitions at Prince of Wales College were composed of choral reading, which was adjudicated by Dr. C. Frederick MacRae of Mount Allison University, while at Birchwood High School Highland and tap dancing were featured. Adjudication was by Mrs. Roger Fink of Halifax, N.S.

Mrs. Fink noted that there were not many good sword dancers in Canada and that the performances featured in this class yesterday were the best she had ever seen on Prince Edward Island.

Winning first place with their rendition of "Lady Clare" was Tracadie Cross School with a mark of 83 in the Rural School, Senior Girls Class. Placing second in this class, which was adjudicated at Prince of Wales College was Fort Augustus School with a mark of 78.
