Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 21.

The residence of A. J. Christie, a prominent lawyer, was entered by burglars last night, and a large quantity of jewelry and silverware stolen.

Mr. Bowell, Minister of Customs, returned to-day from Quebec.

Two Indian chiefs, from the Bay of Quinte reserve, waited upon Minister Dewdney to-day, and presented a memorial, asking that the municipal system of government, lately introduced on the reserves, be abolished, and old customs restored. The Minister would not agree to the request.

A lawyer and ex-alderman named Adams has absconded, after embezzling a large amount of money entrusted to him by his clients for investment.

The Short Line.

MONTREAL, Oct. 23.

The Gazette intimates that the Government will abandon the Short Line railway from Harvey to Salisbury, and that it will consider the propriety of subsidizing the extension of the Temiscouata road. It says the line from Harvey to Salisbury would not save more than twenty-five miles in distance between Montreal and Halifax, and an expenditure of at least \$2,000,000 is a rather stiff price to pay, so much so that a revival of the proposal is not at all probable, and if any further subsidy is to go into short lines in the Maritime Provinces, the merits of the Temiscouata extension clearly exceeds those of the Harvey-Salisbury link.

The Book of Job.

ROCKFORD, Ill., Oct. 23.

Prof. E. L. Curtis, of McCormack Theological Seminary, startled the orthodox congregation of Westminster Presbyterian Church here yesterday by declaring in his sermon his belief that the Book of Job is only a poem written by some pious Jew during the period of his exile. He asserted that the book was only a parable, and that Job and other persons mentioned were but creatures of poetical fancy.

Our African Pioneers.

BERLIN, Oct. 23.

A cable despatch has been received from Captain Wissman, stating that reliable news has been received concerning Henry M. Stanley, Emin Pascha, Senghor Casalt and six Englishmen. All are expected to arrive at Mipwapwa the latter part of November. Capt. Wissman says he defeated a force of six insurgents near Sonive and killed seventy of them.
