The State Case.

WHAT THE STIPENDIARY MAGISTRATE HAS TO SAY.

At the Police Court this forenoon, His Honor Stipendiary Magistrate Fitzgerald made the following remarks in re the Slate case:

I cannot but observe from various contributions to the press that the parties who unfortunately obtained Charles Slate's release from imprisonment are now desirous of using the decision ordering his discharge as a basis for untruthful comments on the administration of justice in this court. I see no reason for remaining silent under such circumstances. I see many for correcting some of these misstatements, especially as they are made under the color of a judgment of a Judge of a court of superior jurisdiction.

First as to this decision, I judge from its terms it does not decide:

1st. That drunkenness is not in the nature of a crime to be proceeded against and punished as such.

2nd. That the offence of drunkenness on the public streets is confined to cases in which the police actually make the arrest.

3rd. That Charles Slate was illegally detained by the police on a charge of drunkenness immediately after the period of his arrest as a witness had expired.

4th. That when a person is actually under arrest and before a magistrate there is any necessity for either information, summons or warrant.

5th. That to remand a prisoner owing to the absence of testimony is illegal.

6th. That the Criminal Procedure Act does not give to the Magistrate the discretion as to when and how often he should remand prisoners charged before him.

Second—As to the comments on this decision:

1st. I desire it to be understood that no man is ever arrested by the police for any offence without a sworn information and warrant, except when the criminal is caught in flagrante delicto.

2nd. That the practice of this court is to allow anyone, including the police, to make a charge against a person then actually in custody for another offence without information, summons or warrant, and to hear and determine such charge when prosecutor and prisoner are both ready for trial, which practice I believe is in accordance with the law.

3rd. That necessarily chronic inebriates and habitual criminals are treated differently from mere casual offenders, and in exercising my discretion as to remands, one class I constantly remand, the other never, except when absolutely necessary.

4th. That Charles Slate for the past eight years has been treated by me with a personal kindness, which I do not think he will be slow to acknowledge; though sometimes such kindnesses have taken the shape of remands.

This is all I deem it necessary to say to avoid a misconception of the practice of this Court, except that I regret to see that a portion of the press is being used by those whose evident desire is to thwart the due administration of justice.
