FOR BOSTON.—The steamer Coila was loaded at Summerside for Boston on Saturday. Her cargo was principally potatoes.

SOME OYSTERS.—It is stated that upwards of 1200 barrels of oysters were taken over to the Potat by the St. Lawrence on Thursday and Friday of last week.

ISLAND OATS.—The Shediak correspondent of the Moncton Transcript says: Two cargoes of oats have just landed here from P. E. Island for Mr. P. J. Sweeney. They are considered of the best quality and command a ready sale.

THEATRICAL.—The Summerside papers speak highly of the performances given by the Boston Comedy Company in that town. This company will open for a short season in this city on Thursday next. They deserve excellent houses.

THE FIRE ALARM.—The firemen promptly responded to the call of duty on Saturday evening. But there was no necessity for their being called out. The alarm was sounded because some sparks were observed falling from the chimney of a house on Euston Street east.

HOLIDAY GOODS.—A consignment of English goods, purchased direct from the manufacturers for cash, will be opened up in a few days. This lot includes many articles not before offered for sale here. Time and place of sale will be announced later on. nov16 31

MORE SHEEP.—The shipments of sheep still continue, says the Pioneer. On Thursday Mr. J. McGrath sent over 215 for St. John; on Friday 418 were shipped by Messrs. Davis & Merrill for Batgor, and on Saturday 208 were shipped by Mr. Hanahan for the United States.

CATTLE FOR ENGLAND.—A Montreal despatch says: "There were eighty thousand head of cattle shipped from this port to England this season, which is 20,000 more than was shipped last season. The profits are reported to have been satisfactory, except on the last few shipments."

A BONANZA.—A valuable deposit of moulding sand has been discovered in Hants Co., N. S., which is said by experts to be equal to the best moulding sand for brass work obtainable in any part of the world. Two or three cargoes have already been shipped to Boston, worth \$7 per ton landed in that city.

WHAT IT COST.—The Halifax carnival cost in the neighborhood of \$11,000. The deficit amounts to \$1,800, and may possibly run over \$2,000. All depends upon the settlement the ball committee may be able to make with Mr. Sheraton, of the Queen Hotel, who is about suing for the amount of his little bill.

CHANGE OF TIME.—Commencing to-day, the trains will arrive at Point du Chene and Pictou later in the day; at Pictou at 1.20 p. m. local instead of 11 a. m.; at Point du Chene at 1.30 local instead of 11.25. This will probably make arrivals here somewhat later. On Friday and Saturday last the very heavy gales in the Gulf was the cause of late arrivals.

IS A HURRY.—A man was hurrying along Queen Square the other day for Paton & Co.'s great clothing store when another man also in violent haste, rushing for the same place, collided with great force. The second man looked angry, while the first man, taking off his hat, said, "My dear sir, I don't know which of us is to blame for this violent encounter; but I am in too great a hurry to investigate. If I ran into you, I beg your pardon; if you ran into me, don't mention it," and he tore away at full speed to secure one of Paton & Co's \$4.75 overcoats.

PHILHARMONIC SOCIETY.—A meeting of the Philharmonic Society (for practice) will be held to-morrow (Tuesday) evening. All members are urgently requested to be present, as preparations are now being made to hold a concert in a short time. The vocal membership is now very large and extra copies of the "May Queen" have been ordered. It has been proposed that only those members of the society be allowed to sing in the concert who shall attend an average of three out of four of all the practices from to-morrow night until the evening of the concert.

CANADA'S GOLD MEDAL PIANOS.—The Williams piano is known in the West and in England as the gold medal piano, from its having received so many gold medals at great exhibitions. The Williams piano, of Toronto, has won over 200 medals the past few years, principally gold, and there are now nearly 18,000 Williams pianos in use, or nearly seven-eighths of all the pianos made in Canada, showing that the public endorses the opinion of the judges who awarded these gold medals. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

The Republic Proclaimed.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

A despatch received from Rio de Janeiro reports that the Republic has been proclaimed with Senor DaFonseca as President. The imperial ministers have been placed under arrest and kept in close confinement. The provisional government has guaranteed protection to the members of the imperial family. Business in the city is suspended, but there is no danger to life or property.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The Brazilian Cabinet has been organized President without portfolio, Deodoro Da Fonseca; Minister of the Interior, Aristides Lobo; Minister of Foreign Affairs, Quintana Bocquim; Minister of Finance, Dr. Ruy Barboza; Minister of Justice, Compos Salles; Minister of War, Benjamin Constant Botelho De Magalhães; Marine Admiral Van Donoock; Minister of Agriculture Demetrio Ribeiro. The Chamber of Deputies has been dissolved and the Council on State has been abolished. Public opinion appears to favor a peaceful trial of the new form of government, and everything is quiet.

LONDON, Nov. 17.

The new Brazilian Government has issued a manifesto announcing the Monarchy abolished. The province of Bahia opposed the republic, but most of the other provinces have signified their adherence to the new regime.

PARIS, Nov. 17.

The Brazilian minister here expresses surprise that several staunch Monarchists whom he thought incapable of treason, were among the reported ringleaders of the Brazilian revolution. He said that republicans were only a small minority, and the emperor was universally beloved. General DaFonseca has much prestige and is popular with the army. The minister scolds the idea that slavery had anything to do with the movement. The republicans he said, supported the emancipation of slaves. The resolution was foreseen, but not expected until after the death of the Emperor.

BRUSSELS, Nov. 17.

The Independance Belge has a despatch from London saying the overthrow of the Brazilian Monarchy is regarded as definite. The Portuguese people sympathize with the Brazilians and similar events are possible in Portugal.

The Panama Canal.

PARIS, Nov. 17.

A committee of engineers appointed to report on the Panama Canal, will sail for the Isthmus shortly. They have been charged to conceal no unfavorable facts and not to underrate anything that is of a hopeful nature.

A Fine Passage.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.

The Allan steamer Sardinian, the first weekly mail boat to arrive at Halifax this winter, made the port on Saturday evening after a fine passage. She landed 113 passengers.

Will Not Interfere.

LONDON, Nov. 16.

The Standard's correspondent at Constantinople says the powers have informed the Porte that they will not interfere with the Ottoman policy of either Turkey or Greece.

Sad Suicide.

HALIFAX, Nov. 17.

Charles E. Creighton, deputy prothonotary, committed suicide by blowing out his brains yesterday afternoon. The coroner's jury returned a verdict of temporary insanity.

Dropped Dead.

OTTAWA, Nov. 17.

A private telegram from New York states that Dr. Wilson, Law Clerk of the Commons, dropped dead in the street there last night.

McMaster, president, and Wm. Cook, cashier, and is dated May 1st, 1871.

This is the third of the family within a short period who has succumbed to the grim King of Terrors, all carried off by the same disease—typhoid fever. First there was Mrs. Dawson, then Mrs. Thos.
