PREPARING FOR SPAIN'S WARSHIPS.

Cuba not to be Invaded.

SCHLEY AND SAMPSON TO COMBINE FORCES.

And Force a Fight With the Spaniards.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER]

WASHINGTON, May 14.—The flying squadron put to sea at 3 p. m., yesterday, under orders to proceed to Havana to prevent the possibility of the seige being raised by the Spanish fleet at Martini-

que. Now that the Spanish fleet has been located it is the intention of the Government to suspend operations looking to the invasion of Cuba and direct all its energies to crushing the formidable flotilla under Admiral Corvera, and incidentally to bar the execution of the designs. The wily Spaniards may have against the battleship Oregon with her consorts, the gunboat Marieta, the cruiser Nicheteroy, which will have to cross the line of operations of the enemy's fleet.

Schley and Sampson are instructed to co-operate and endeavor to coop up the Spanish fleet and force it to a fight.

Speculation is rife as to the probable intention of the Spanish commander regarding a naval base.

Admiral Corvera is familiar with Cuban waters, and is a young man of undoubted genius.

Both the American squadrons have positive instructions to find the Spanish fleet and destroy it, or blockade it in some port.

The next forty-eight hours can hardly fail to produce stirring events, and nobody here is to confident of the result.

Naval officers are of opinion that the Spanish fleet will be heard from next before Havana.

Sampson's fleet is said to be no match for the Spanish in speed.

GERMANY IS NOT FAVORABLE TO AMERICAN OCCUPATION

This step is considered as foreshadowing further action on the part Germany in favor of Spain.

He swore that he had never written a letter about the purchase of the Drummond Railway to Rufus Pope or anyone else. The matter never was considered by him at all, and never came before any government of which he was a member. If it had, it would not have impressed him favorably.

Rufus Pope who was alleged to have shown Farewell the letter swore positively that he had never shown a letter from Tupper or any other Minister concerning the Drummond Road and never had one to show.

OTTAWA, May 14.—The Earl of Aberdeen gives out the correspondence between himself and the Prime Minister, showing that private interests and family claims make it desirable that Lord Aberdeen should return home before the end of the present year, and the Colonial Secretary has granted Lord Aberdeen's application to be relieved of his present duties in October or November of this year.

The two persons most prominently mentioned recently as likely to succeed to Lord Aberdeen are the Earl of Selbourne, under Secretary of State for the Colonies and the Earl of Hopetown.

Dissension in the Cabinet.

A special Washington despatch to the Star reports "A serious difference of opinion has arisen between Secretary Alger, of the War Department, and Secretary Gage, of Treasury. Thus far it has been kept secret, but it is said that it has reached a point where one or the other will have to give way and retire from the Cabinet. The clash came, it is said, because Secretary Gage has insisted on embarrassing in every possible way the plans of the War Department. It is claimed my friends of Secretary Alger that when he asks for \$5,000,000 to carry on extensive plans, Secretary Gage insists upon the detailed account and does out money in dribbles. The attitude of Secretary Gage is due to the renewed efforts of the peace party."

MAIL CLERK SHOT HIMSELF

OTTAWA, May 13.—Fred MacDougall, son of Hon. William MacDougall, of Ottawa, attempted suicide in Winnipeg by shooting himself in the head while under the influence of opium. He was a railway mail clerk running between Port Arthur and Winnipeg. He is still alive, but there is little hope of his recovery.
