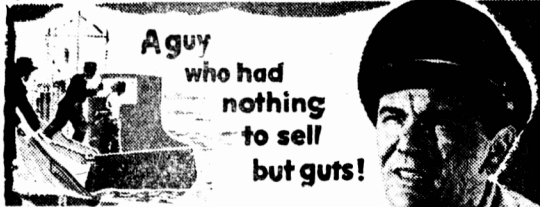

Plan Transportation Of Montague Children To Capital For Royal Visit

Arrangements to transport the children of Montague to Charlottetown on Friday, Nov. 9th for the Royal visit were made last night at a special session of the Town Council. His Worship, Mayor B. H. Yeo presided over the joint meeting at which were present representatives of the Home and School Association, Masonic Lodge, Montague Legion, Oddfellows, and the School Board.

The primary problem of transportation was discussed at length, and after several ways had been proposed, it was decided to secure a sufficient number of trucks to transport the children. The trucks are to be covered with tarpaulins, have seating accommodations, and several supervisors in each truck. The children from grades one to five provided the greatest difficulty, but it was felt that with a sufficient number of supervisors the difficulty would be overcome.

A committee including Messrs. Charles Fraser and Cecil Beck, with power to add additional members, was appointed to look after procuring the trucks.

It was decided that the several organizations would help provide seating accommodations in accordance with their ability. There are between 150 and 160 children from all grades who will require transportation, it was reported by Mr. Vernon MacLean, school principal. The committee was then instructed to secure eight trucks which were thought ample to transport the number.

It was moved and seconded that the town would share in the cost of such transportation, and other organizations were in favor subject to an executive meeting of the particular organization.

During the remainder of the week plans will be finalized including securing of flags for the children, deciding on time and place for departure, selecting trucks available and supervisors.

Annual Meeting Of Georgetown Credit Union

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Credit Union Ltd. was held in St. James Hall on Monday evening, Oct. 24th, with Mr. George MacCormack in the chair.

The report of the Directors by the president, the financial statement by the secretary-treasurer, the credit committee by Mrs. Rupert Wight, and the supervisory committee by Mayor P. J. Boudreau, showed progress during the year.

Membership has risen to 100 — an increase of 16 — with savings of \$10,000, an increase of \$2,000 during the year. Twenty-four loans totalling over \$6,000 were made to members during the year.

The secretary-treasurer, Rev. O. Kiggins, in his report pointed out that all shares and loans were insured by The Credit Union Mutual Association, by payments made from the earnings of the Credit Union and not as a direct charge on each shareholder. This provided an insurance without cost up to \$1,000 for all members under 70 years. Loans made by members were likewise protected, 20% of earnings being set aside as a Guaranty Fund and 5% for an Educational Fund. As the earnings of the Credit Union were small he advised that League dues, in future, should be charged to individual share capital, instead of being a direct charge against the earnings of the Credit Union, and he made a motion to this effect.

This motion caused a lively discussion. Mayor Boudreau was afraid that this would tend to lessen membership, as small shares would be used up in payment of League dues. Other members were of the opinion that those who were neglecting to increase their shares and were not borrowers, were of little benefit to the Credit Union.

Mr. J. T. McIsaac, fieldman for the P. E. Island Credit Union League, told the members that most of the Credit Unions were charging League dues to individual shares. A few Credit Unions were making an exception for school children.

The treasurer's motion was seconded and in future League dues will be a direct charge against individual shares. The manager then moved a 2% dividend. A motion to adjourn for lunch was
