OTTAWA LETTER

The Caron Charges.

(Special correspondence of The Examiner.)

There were only two business days last week—Wednesday and Friday. The former was wholly occupied with the consideration of the criminal law, about one-fourth of which has now been disposed of.

On Friday, Sir John Thompson moved that the House do approve of the appointment of Justice Louthier and Tait as commissioners to take evidence in the matter of the charges against Sir A. P. Caron.

Mr. Laurier opposed the motion, and moved in amendment that the charges made by Mr. Edgar be referred to a special committee. Hon. David Mills seconded the amendment.

Sir John Thompson, in an effective speech, defended the course of the Government. Having pointed out that the House had already decided to refer the charges to a commission, and that they would be stultifying themselves if they adopted Mr. Laurier's amendment, to refer them to a special committee, Sir John proceeded to say: "The leader of the Opposition said this was a matter altogether within the province of the House, and a matter in which the House could be the only judge."

Mr. Laurier, in raising that cry as to the power of the House over its members, had attempted to divert the attention of the House from the real issue, whether it was a convenient practice with regard to charges of this kind to have evidence taken by royal commissioners and submitting that evidence to the House for action afterwards.

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Football.
