Seek Analytic Guidance Is Advice To Depressed



Dear Mary Haworth: I very much need your guidance in helping my daughter. She is 28, pretty, and has a very good job as a commercial artist.

She is a good dancer, is very good at sports, enjoys a good music, etc., but hasn't been able to find friends since she broke up with her boy friend.

All her friends are married now and have their own lives; she is the only one unmarried. She has become very depressed.

It seems likely that she is rather tragically immature and dependent for her age, socially and psychologically unprepared to be suitably resourceful in surmounting the inevitable vicissitudes of the inevitable.

Your acute concern to help her heartbreak and depression (as you think) by finding a new friend for her suggests that you've probably consistently coddled her, with overly supervisory zeal, into a very passive dependency.

Consequently, when she tries to shape - up on her own in the adult arena, she mistakes a boy friend for a mom - substitute and smothers him with her dependency demands, so that he finally takes to his heels, leaving her demoralized, with almost no comprehension of why they broke - up.

Such my concept of her distress, which I consider serious. She needs specialist guidance immediately. I strongly recommend her to seek help; or, at the very least, psychological counselling, to revive her self-esteem and get her squared - off in the direction of wholesome growth and mature integrity. Dear V.S.: To help your daughter, assuming she will cooperate, first you must understand the nature of her problem. I am sure it is more complicated than you realize, so you are aware of, at present.

It is unrealistic to offer the friends (1) because they all got married, and (2) because she broke off with the boy friend.

A well - balanced girl who has good friendships and values them doesn't lose friends just because they marry, or because she is dropped by a beau.

Brides who thought a lot of her in the old days will make opportunities to keep in touch. They will fit her into their all - girl luncheons; also as "extra women" to match the parties or other social clambers.

They will confide in her rather than another young woman, when they want to talk secrets without the word getting back to everybody in the "young married set" to which they belong. (I am not inventing this; I've seen it happening in the overlapping spinstar - and housewife circles that wash up on my doorstep).

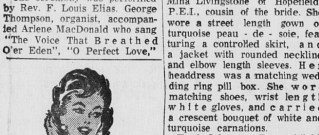
The bride's mother received wearing a two - piece dress of toned blue silk with matching hat and white accessories. Her corsage was of white roses.
