Sir, — In Manchester, on Sept. 5, 1910, Bill MacKinnon of Roxbury, Mass., was declared the winner of a hard-fought 15-rounder with New York's Frankie Mantill. MacKinnon did practically all his boxing in Yankee rings, but was a native of Mount Stewart, P.E.I. He left the province around the turn of the century, and after doing so, began boxing as an amateur, winning several New England titles. After three years in this calibre he entered the "punch for pay" ranks and fought with success in such boxing centers as New York, Saint Paul and Toronto. Although he never held a world title, he had the distinction of having fought seven universal champs. The only titles of any kind that he held were the New England middleweight and light heavyweight.

It is estimated that MacKinnon battled in over 200 ring events, with his defeats few and far between. Among the all-time greats that MacKinnon fought were included such ring personalities as Jack "Twin" Sullivan, Frank Walcott, Jack Dillon, Joe Klaus, Harry Lewis, Eddie McGoorty, Battling Levinsky, Roddy MacDonald, Tom Sullivan, Mike Gibbons, Joe Thomas and Jack Booner.
